4-Square Christmas Programs

Next Sunday evening, Dec. 18th, at the Foursquare Church a very beautiful and impressive Christmas program will be given by the young people of the church. There has been a great demand during the present cold weather for comforters and several have been given out. Inasmuch as there is now no other active relief agency dispensing clothing in Coquille it will be appreciated if you will send to the Foursquare Church your cast-off garments or telephone Mrs. Knife and they will be called for.

It is the desire of the Foursquare commissary exchange to render a real Christian service to the needy of this

community.
