Its members are Mariene Dietrich and Josef von Sternberg. "Blonde Venus" coming to the Liberty Theatre Sunday, is their latest co-operative effort, with Miss Dietrich in the starring role and Von Sternberg as the director.

The Dietrich-Von Sternberg team had its origin in Berlin late in 1929. Von Sternberg, already a noted figure in the movie world, had been called there to direct Emil Janings in "The Blue Angel," which was being made in English and German.

In search of a leading woman; Von Sternberg scoured Berlin, but without success. One night, half in hope of finding what he wanted, he went to a musical comedy. Miss Dietrich was its star, and the moment Von Sternberg saw her he knew she was the woman he had been seeking.

She accepted the offer to play in the picture, and appeared in both the English and German versions.

Then Von Sternberg was called back to Hollywood, but when he went, Miss Dietrich went with him. He directed her in "Morocco," her first American-made film, which was so great a success that prints of the English version of "The Blue Angel" were rushed to American screens. It scored again.


