Effective Health Work

(Oregon State Board of Health)
The Hygienic Laboratory of the State Board of Health of Oregon provides a free diagnostic service to the physicians of the state of Oregon. The reports are sent to the physician by telephone, telegraph or mail according to the urgency of the case. A duplicate report is sent at the same time to the County Health Officer to aid him in his communicable disease control work.

The diagnostic services rendered by the laboratory make it possible to study the possibilities of disease prevention and control. As a result of such studies undulant fever was recognized in the state of Oregon.

The examination of specimens submitted for the diagnosis of diphtheria, typhoid and paratyphoid fever, tuberculosis, the venereal diseases and water for potability constitute the major activities of the hygienic laboratory.

Last year, as a result of supplemental tests, in addition to positive findings in regard to more widely prevalent diseases 22 cases of undulant fever and 10 cases of typhoid were discovered in the state of Oregon.
