Mary Esther Treadgold

The following item, clipped from the Grants Pass Courier, tells of the death of a former Bandon girl, Mary Esther Treadgold, who was a niece of Mrs. Pearl Ellingsen, of Coquille, Mrs. Richard Danielson, of the lower river, and Mrs. Calver Mace, of Santa Cruz, California:

Mary Esther Treadgold, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Manton E. Treadgold, passed away Wednesday afternoon, at three o'clock, at the Treadgold residence, after an illness of six weeks. Complications resulting from scarlet fever were the cause of her death.

Miss Treadgold was born in Bandon, Oregon, December 20, 1915, and was aged 17 years and 28 days at the time of her death. Spending her early life in Coos county, she came to Grants Pass with her parents two years ago, from Portland. Entering the local high school she soon became an outstanding pupil by reason of her high grades, aptitude and diligence. Miss Treadgold held one of the most esteemed positions in the high school this year, that of president of the Torch Honor society.

The deceased was a member of the Episcopal church.

Besides her parents, Miss Treadgold is survived by one sister, Genevieve, and one brother, Frederic.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon with Rev. H. H. Mitchell officiating.
