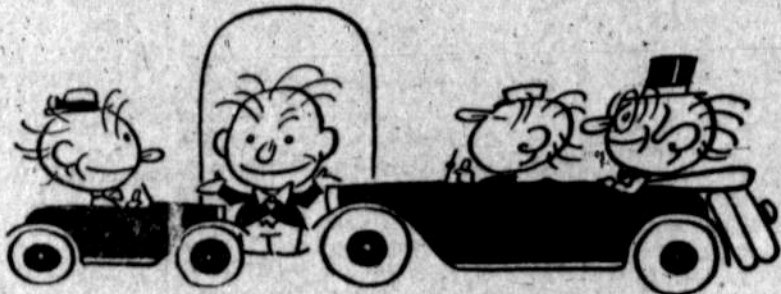

County Surveyor Vinton's Offer to County Court

To carry out his campaign slogan of economy in Coos county road affairs, County Surveyor E. L. Vinton last month addressed a letter to the county court, reprinted below, but has been informed that no immediate change in the road department is contemplated.

Considering the small amount of county road work which may be done this year, the Sentinel is not informed whether the \$1800 for general road supervision, mentioned in Mr. Vinton's letter, will be spent or not:

To the Honorable County Court of Coos County, Oregon.

Gentlemen: The budget as adopted for the year 1933 shows that the salary for general road supervisor is \$1800.00, the salary for a part time roadmaster is \$400.00, and the salary, surveying and platting for the county surveyor is \$800.00. The sum of the above is \$3000.00.

By combining the office of roadmaster and county surveyor a considerable saving can be made to the taxpayers.

At this time, I believe that every step for economy should be taken, and with this in mind, I am offering to combine the office of roadmaster and county surveyor for a salary of \$2400.00 per year, thus making a saving of \$600.00 annually.
