"Ham" Moore on Coquille
In the Oregonian

Some 19 years ago there was a youngster in the Coquille schools known as "Ham." His name was Harold A. Moore, and he was the son of an osteopathic physician practicing here. He is now living in Portland and writes the "Those Who Come and Go" items which appear on the editorial page of the Oregonian daily. In last Sunday's issue Hal Moore had a page in the magazine section with a short story about the ten towns in Oregon in which he had lived. Following is his recollection of Coquille as it existed two decades ago:

COQUILLE: The county seat of Coos county is one of Mother Nature's pets. The quickest way to list its natural advantages is to list the things it doesn't have—and the only thing that comes to mind is a snow-capped mountain peak for winter sports. Myrtle trees grow in the Coquille valley in great profusion. The weather is never really hot in summer, just nice and warm—and the Coquille river was just made for pleasant swimming. Winters are never cold. Hunting and fishing is, or was, a lazy man's sport there. Your Coquille citizen can, if he wants, set his alarm clock for 3 A. M. during the deer season, eat a nice breakfast and walk a couple of miles out of town, get several nice shot at blacktail bucks and be back to his store or office in time to open up for business at the usual hour. And if he's any kind of a shot he won't come back empty-handed. At least that's the Coquille I knew. Duck shooting could be had almost within the city limits. Everyone knew each other in Coquille and the social life consisted of lodge parties, public and organization dances and private parties.

The town cop had to be pretty good with his fists, for some rather husky loggers roamed Coos county and it was common custom to form a ring around the cop and the liquor-agitated logger whenever a fight started. I never knew a cop to take a licking. In the old days, too, Coquille was wont to stage come pretty good murder trials—rather often. Since the railroad connected Coos with the outside world in 1916, and its isolation ended, there hasn't been so much of that, I'm told. Athletically the town is noted for the old Oeding brothers basketball team and the fact that it developed the famous Leslie brothers of the University of Oregon 1919 Pacific coast conference gridiron champions. Its water supply used to be considered superior to Portland's.

Next Week at the Liberty

Elmer A. Beckett Dies

Old-time Coquille residents will remember E. A. Beckett who left Coquille with his family nearly 17 years ago. Mrs. Ralph Nosler yesterday received a clipping from Mrs. Beckett with an announcement of her husband's death which occurred at Ventura, Calif., last Friday. The clipping read:

Pneumonia last night claimed the life of Elmer Allen Beckett, proprietor of the El Nido hotel, despite a valiant effort by the pulmotor squad from the central fire station, which worked 44 hours without cessation, to prolong his life. Pneumonia followed an illness from the flu.

The deceased is survived by his widow, one daughter, Helen W., of the telephone company; and two sons, Ted of Oakland, and Elmer, a student in the Ventura junior college.

Mr. Beckett came to Ventura from Las Vegas, Nev., three years ago last August to take over the El Nido hotel, having been in the hotel business most of his life. He was born in Noble county, Ohio, but came west when a boy. Mr. Beckett was a member of the Woodmen of the World.
