old Coos Bay Wagon road. The four boys made the trip in about two weeks. They all arrived eventually at what is now the county farm, then owned by a man named May, but occupied by the grandfather of the deceased. The parents came by easy stages because of the inability of the mother and the two daughters to walk fast or far at a stretch, the youngest daughter being then about three years of age. The father, being a bricklayer by trade, watched every opportunity for work along the road and stopped over in some places for weeks doing work in his trade, and they arrived at their destination in Coos county about a year after the boys.

The deceased followed logging and sawmilling practically all of his life in Coos county, but operated the Bullard ferry and did some fishing at times.

He was married June 21, 1890, at Prosper, to Sarah Pierce, and he and his family have resided in and near Prosper and Bandon ever since his marriage.

He leaves his wife, two sons and three daughters to mourn his departure. His sons are John and Cassius Jr., and his daughters are Mrs. Eva Hicking, Mrs. Anna Hicking and Mrs. Florence Fogel, all residing at Bandon and being at his bedside during his last illness. The nature of his ailment was diagnosed as gall stones or cancer of the bladder, or something affecting that organ, of which the attending physicians were uncertain. However, with the consent of the family, a post mortem is to be made and it is hoped that the information thus obtained may be useful to physicians in treating similar cases.

Besides his children he left four grandchildren, Evelyn, Mack and John Layton Fogel and Donald Lee Goodman. Luther L. Goodman and Mrs. J. J. Stanley, of Coquille, and Miss M. Goodman and Mrs. Florence Upton, of Centralia, Wash., are brothers and sisters. Two of his brothers passed away recently.

The deceased was one of the most highly esteemed and respected pioneers of this county, admitted by all who knew him, which is legion, for his strict honesty and square dealing with his fellow men. He never sought high places in public affairs, but was content to perform his duty as he saw it as a common everyday laborer; and if his reward is measured by the number of jewels in his crown, the jewels will be unnumbered.

The Firefly's Light

Truncheon Only Weapon

A wooden truncheon, or staff, made of cocus wood, 15 inches long, with a leather strap to secure it to the wrist, is the traditional weapon of the metropolitan police of London. Revolvers are kept only at the stations, to be issued in special cases where there is reason to believe that encounters with armed criminals are likely to occur. Mounted police have longer truncheons. The metropolitan police orders provide that truncheons are to be used only in extreme cases, and when ever used by a constable must be submitted to the station officer for subsequent inspection.

City Victim of Eruption

A melancholy interest attaches to Martinique, the "Queen of the Caribbean." What was previous to May 8, 1902, a beautiful and prosperous island is now half desolate. It was on that date that the eruption of Mt. Pelee, plainly visible from the ship's deck, utterly destroyed the charming city of St. Pierre with its 30,000 inhabitants. The city and its people lie buried beneath a thick blanket of lava ashes. It is recorded that the gayety, jiving creole women of St. Pierre were the most beautiful females to be found in the entire West Indies. Empress Josephine was born in Martinique.

Osprey Expert Fisher

The osprey, or fishhawk, as its name implies, lives entirely on fish. It is an expert at hovering above the surface of the water until a fish is seen near the surface when the osprey dives in a swift, powerful rush which often carries it a foot and a half beneath the surface, but which seldom fails to land its prey.
