meeting was to determine whether the high school wished to send their basketball team to the Southern Oregon tournament at Ashland, March 18, 17 and 18. It was decided that by putting on several extra programs, of various kinds the trip could be financed, so the boys will journey southward in a couple of weeks to try and win first place this year as they have won second and third places in previous years.

Ground Shell Lime for Farmers to Be Cheaper

The cost of ground shell to farmers in Coos county will be lowered as a result of action taken by the directors of the Coos County Lime and Fertilizer Association at its recent meeting held in the Coos Bay Mutual Creamery in Marshfield when the fee for membership in the association was reduced to twenty cents per year.

This action was taken, according to the directors, in an effort to provide ground shell to farmers of the county at the lowest cost possible at this time. In manufacturing the ground shell the raw material is dredged from the bay and thoroughly washed before it is ground and ready for sale. The membership fee of twenty cents entitles one to purchase as much of the ground material as he may want during the year at the actual cost of manufacturing which, at this time, is five dollars per ton. According to statements made following the meeting the price of the ground shell should be lowered as volume of sales increases.

The Coos County Lime and Fertilizer association was organized during the past year by a group of farmers and the county agent for the purpose of taking shells from Coos Bay and manufacturing a product to be used for agricultural purposes throughout the county. Directors and officers of the association include D. F. Thompson, Coquille, president; Ivy Condron, North Bend, vice-president; J. A. Larson, Marshfield; Alton Kay, Leno; E. L. Dellefuen, Coquille; George Hampton, Arago, and George Jenkins, county agent, is secretary of the association.

Soil tests which have been made during recent years in the county agent's office show that the soil in most sections of Coos county is acid and would be benefitted for the production of most crops by the application of ground shell or some other form of lime. Experimental work was done at the Coast Experiment Station also shows the advantage of

lime in increasing yields and maintaining stands of clover, vetches and other legumes. The application of limestone has made it possible to grow alfalfa successfully in different sections of Coos county. Its use on soils here is beyond the experimental stage and can safely be commended as a practical means of lowering the cost of producing farm products by increasing yields and improving the quality of many crops.

Next Week at the Liberty

The motion picture, in its entire history, has seldom produced a love story of such tenderness and such heroic beauty as the film version of Ernest Hemingway's great novel, "A Farewell to Arms," which, with Helen Hayes and Gary Cooper in the leading roles, opens Sunday at the Liberty Theatre.

The film follows the Hemingway novel with remarkable fidelity. Against the stark background of war in the Alps is played out the story of the American lieutenant in the Italian ambulance corps and the English war nurse whose love proved greater than war or duty or anything in the past or future of either of them.

One hundred miles per hour speed-boat racing, the world's most thrilling sport, is shown in "Fast Life," the breath-taking action picture featuring William Haines that opens next Wednesday at the Liberty Theatre.

No effort has been spared to bring the roaring realism of boat racing to the screen. The camera was evidently mounted on a craft following so close to the speeding racers that the results obtain startling effects in reproduction. How collisions were avoided until the big boat smashup does take place is a marvel of combined motion picture and marine engineering.
