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Supt. C. A. Howard Makes
Economy Suggestions

C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, has issued a folder to school boards and clerks in all Oregon districts in which he makes recommendations for savings in school expenses that may enable some schools to be kept open next fall where it now looks as though it would be impossible to do so, due to the delinquency in tax payments. Following are his suggestions:

Each school clerk is urged to carefully check on the total outstanding indebtedness of the district, including both warrants and bonds, as well as the amount of delinquent taxes and cash on hand, and inform the board before it contracts for school expenditures for the coming term. In districts where the warrants are a year or more behind it is recommended that a shorter term of school be held rather than ruin the district's credit by piling up a greater warrant debt. A minimum number of months might be contracted with the understanding that should the school finances improve additional time would be added. Payment of taxes, in part if not in full, should be encouraged.

It is urged that careful study be given to the provisions of the "County School District" law, endorsed by many taxpayer and teacher organizations.

It is suggested that school warrants be issued in small denominations in order to enable the school employees to market them more readily.

Howard recommends that the small schools join together temporarily as an emergency measure in districts where transportation can be arranged cheaper than the cost of running separate institutions.

School boards of schools where there is room for additional pupils are asked to invite pupils to come from other districts at a reasonably low tuition charge.

Whenever feasible small districts are advised to merge into larger districts, making possible better schools at lower cost to the taxpayers.

In extreme emergency cases it is recommended that schools be operated on a half-day basis, with each teacher handling a grade or several grades in the morning, and another grade or several grades in the afternoon. Each group would spend the alternate half-day in home study or in specially arranged study hall at school.

Another method is for two schools to employ a single teacher between

them, teaching in each school in alternate weeks. Home assignments to be studied during the intervening weeks would be made by the teacher. It is also suggested that receipts from community enterprises be donated to the school for the purchase of textbooks and other equipment.

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
