Why the Cow Bell Dairy Has made Milk and Cream Safe By Pasteurization

"Infectious abortion of cattle is the cause of great losses to the cattle industries, and has a significance, of as yet undetermined importance, in respect to human life. This disease is caused by a germ commonly known as *Brucella abortus*.

This germ has been found to cause undulant fever in man, the disease being acquired through the consumption of raw milk from abortion-infected cows.

"To avoid danger from this disease milk should be pasteurized."

Next Week at the Liberty

"Strange Interlude," one of the pictures which theatre goers have been waiting to see, comes to the Liberty, Sunday, and continues Monday and Tuesday, Clarke Gable and Norma Shearer are the stars in "Strange Interlude." It presents the unique phenomenon of a photoplay which is really two pictures in one. Not only were two recording systems used—one for the regular dialogue and one for the spoken thoughts or "asides"—but the picture was actually photographed twice. This involved more than double the time and effort required for the average photoplay, on the part of both cast and technicians.

The method used in filming "Strange Interlude" is believed to be the most intricate yet worked out by sound picture engineers, altering the entire technique usually followed in the making of a dialogue film. To complete a scene successfully, the utmost concentration of cast and technical workers was necessary. The double dialogue had to be carefully rehearsed and timed to a split second. Every slight inflection of voice had to be committed to memory. Everything depended upon entire accord between the human and mechanical elements at hand.

Tonight and Saturday James Cagney in another hit, "Hard to Handle," with Mary Brian and Claire Dodd.

Leo Carrillo, noted character actor of the stage and screen, heads the cast of "Deception," romantic drama of a boy, who was dazzled by fame and then dizzied by a dame. This picture will be the preview Saturday night.

In "Frisco Jenny" she appears as the Queen of the Demi-monde, who rules her kingdom with an iron hand, a woman hard and unscrupulous, yet with an underlying tenderness and so unsurpassable a love for her only son, that she goes to the gallows with sealed lips rather than acquit him with his mother's shame.

"Frisco Jenny" is a stirring and glamorous tale of the old Barbary Coast of San Francisco, with its temples of pleasure, its gilded dives and gambling dens which formed the background for the wild orgies of the young bloods of the city a quarter of a century ago.
