O. S. C. Commencement

The sixty-fourth annual commencement at Oregon State college is announced for Monday, June 5, when, according to the tentative list, degrees will be conferred on 489 members of the graduating class. Of this number 431 will receive the bachelor's degree and 58 will get master's degrees. This is the largest class to complete advanced study in the history of the institution.

Dr. Mervin Gordon Neale, president of the University of Idaho, will deliver the commencement address, with Dr. W. J. Kerr, chancellor of the Oregon system of higher education, presiding for his twenty-sixth annual commencement on the state college campus.

4-H Club Girls to Compete in Style Dress Revue

Four-H Club girls of this county are now eligible to compete in the National 4-H Club Girls Style Dress Revue Contest for the valuable training and many fine prizes offered, according to word from the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work of Chicago, which is conducting the contest in cooperation with the state and county club leaders.

The county champion in this contest will be awarded a gold filled medal of honor. A finely engraved certificate of merit will be awarded the second winning girl. The county champion is then eligible to enter the state contest in the fall to compete for state championship. The winner in this contest will receive a prize trip to the national contest, which is a feature of the Twelfth National Club Congress to be held in connection with the International Live Stock Exposition, December 1-9 in Chicago.

In this final contest state champions will be required to model a garment of their own making in one of four classes. They are the cotton school costume, tailored costume, afternoon costume and informal party costume. The national champion and runner-up will each receive a prize educational tour with chaperones to Shrines of American History in the summer of 1934 with all expenses paid. A fine solid gold medal of honor is also awarded the national champion. The third and fourth winners will each receive a gold wrist watch valued at \$75.

The four girls winning second in their classes will receive \$40 gold wrist watches given with the other prizes by the Chicago Mail Order Company, which is sponsoring this contest for the third season to aid in advancing 4-H club work among rural girls.
