"King of the Jungles"
Coming to Liberty Sunday

Kaspa, the Lion Man, and Romulus and Remus, the two legendary infants credited with the founding of Rome, have much in common, according to Max Marcin, adaptor of the screen story, "King of the Jungle," which relates the fabulous experiences of a white god of the jungle.

According to Marcin, the Lion Man and the twins who are alleged to have founded the Roman Empire, were both suckled by wild beasts from infancy.

Kaspa, the Lion Man, "King of the Jungle," which comes Sunday to the Liberty Theatre screen for three days, was orphaned in the jungle as a child when his white parents were killed on a hunting expedition. Adopted by a lioness, the baby was brought up as one of her cubs, growing to manhood unaware of his human antecedents, believing himself one of the pack he ran and hunted with, and growing in strength and power until he became king of the King of Beasts.

According to old poetic legend, Marcin declares, the story of Romulus and Remus has many points of similarity. The two infants, princes by blood, were the sons of Mars and Rhea, the latter a daughter of Numitor. Amulius, the usurper of the throne of Alba on the Italian peninsula, who had taken power in defiance of his brother, Numitor, ordered the infants thrown into the River Tiber.

The basket in which they were placed drifted downstream with the current until it became entangled in vines near the foot of Palantine Hill.

The legend, according to the writer of "King of the Jungle," goes on to say that the infants were found by a wild she-wolf and suckled by her as if they were her own cubs. Romulus and Remus were found in the wolf's den by Faustulus, one of the King's herdsmen, who took the princelings home to his wife. It was she who subsequently raised them to manhood, naming them Romulus and Remus.

Upon reaching manhood, Romulus was chosen by the inhabitants of the surrounding territory as their king. They built the ramparts of the city of Rome under his direction and under him conquered neighboring tribes, as well as the civilizations of Greece and Carthage.

For the role of Kaspa, the Lion Man, Paramount chose the most perfectly formed specimen of American manhood, Buster Crabbe, world's champion Olympic swimmer, holder of five world's records, and 35 national marks.
