Another meeting of the Flower Show committee was held Monday night at the home of Geo. W. Taylor. Committee chairmen, appointed at the previous meeting, were in attendance also and plans and duties talked over. It was decided to fix the date of the show at the next regular meeting of the Flower Lovers Club which is June 6th. Come and give us ideas and suggestions. It is going to take "all hands and the cook" to put this show over and make it a success. We are all interested in the welfare of our town and our flower shows are events which are looked forward to by the flower lovers in the county.

Many people are complaining of depredations to their yards caused by dogs and cats. The owners in question hate to complain to their neighbors and yet endurance of the damages caused is ceasing to be a virtue. In reading the Garden Page of the "Sunday Oregonian," I found a solution which one lady told me she had tried successfully. It is to spray your plants and shrubs with a solution of nicotine sulphate, which leaves an odor offensive to cats and dogs, and also rabbits, if you have any of them bothering you, as we had a short time ago. The spray mentioned is a stand-

by for combatting aphids and other sucking insects and can be used on tree trunks as well as plants. Even a weak solution of 1½ teaspoons of the ordinary commercial 40 per cent nicotine sulphate preparation to one gallon of water is as strong as needed, some claim.

The article I read warned against the loss of baby chicks and bantams from eating rose bugs which have been sprayed. Many people have the chickens in their yards to eat the earwigs and other destructive bugs.

It is getting earwig season, so watch for these pests and be ready to combat them. Before putting out poisons for them, it would be well to find out from Mr. Taylor, the president of the Flower Club, where the parasitic districts are, as the club last year purchased a colony of parasitized earwigs and placed them in different sections of the town.

Many people are also having trouble with the sparrows eating their peas, both vegetable and sweet kind. An easy way to stop that is to place stakes at the ends of the rows and in between, if the rows are long; fasten crosspieces on the top, from which dangle pieces of bright tin from the ends of stout strings. The wind causes these to sway and swing and the little pests are scared away.

Roses are to be used in the cup contest next Tuesday night at the club, so be sure to be there with yours when the president calls he meeting to order at 8 p. m.
