Ag Boys Are at Work On Their Projects

Now that school has closed the boy taking Smith-Hughes agriculture finds his practical work and instruction just beginning. There are 45 students enrolled in this work in Coquille high school and W. M. Canning, the local instructor, is kept busy throughout the summer months visiting projects and giving practical instruction.

Every boy has at least two farm enterprises for his project. That these projects assume no small proportion is shown by the figures taken from the summary of last year's report. This report takes in all boys entered during the year whether they complete the school year or not:

Number of boys with project—59.
Total charges—\$8,479.34.
Total credits—\$12,677.93.
Net profit—\$4,198.59.

Paid self for labor—\$1,418.05.
Total hours devoted to project—5615.

No. of visits by instructor—684.

The projects were made up of the following farm enterprises:

Beef—13 head.
Bees—23 stands.
Berries—1/4 acre.
Dairying—71 head.
Field Crops—8 acres.
Poultry—988 head.
Sheep—31 head.
Swine—32 head.
Fitch—5 pair.
Turkeys—65 head.

The purpose of Smith-Hughes training is to give the boy practical and theoretical instruction in agriculture, so that upon graduation from high school he will be enabled to take up some phase of agricultural work and make a living at it. This work should be of great value to every boy, whether he intends to follow farming or not. An understanding of agriculture and agricultural problems can be used in any major business enterprise and is almost a prerequisite in some.

Seven Candidates for Non-High School Directors

(From Co. Supt. Office)
Names of seven candidates will be placed on the ballot for the non-high school districts. These candidates will be voted upon on June 19th in all of the districts which have no high schools and are not in union high school districts.

The law provides that all ballots be sent into the county superintendent and counted by the district boundary board. The candidate from each zone receiving the highest vote is declared elected from that zone.

To each school clerk, Martha E. Mulkey, county superintendent has mailed notices to be posted, announcing the meeting. The seven candidates are:

Zone I—W. M. Hillar, Empire.
Zone II—R. T. Whitty, Eastside; Adam Donaldson, Jr., Catching Inlet.
Zone III—Neil O. Watson, Millington.

Zone IV—J. W. Powell, Riverside; W. E. Cross, Roy Dist., Coquille.
Zone V—J. N. Gearhart, Pleasant Hill.

Any voter who is qualified to vote for a school clerk or director is qualified to vote on these candidates, therefore it behooves all persons interested in matters of tax and in education of high school boys and girls to express themselves through ballot on June 19th.
