"Goono Goona," (Love Powder), Shows at Liberty Tonight



In "Goono-Goono" (Love Powder), which opens tonight at the Liberty Theatre, the producers, Andre Roosevelt and Armand Denis, have portrayed a wonder race in their native land, Bali, a small island just east of Java.

The women are beautiful. They have supple, well-made bodies whose breasts point proudly and chastely. Indeed these savage folks are naive, simple and innocent. The men, too, are well proportioned, a perfect type of athlete. None of them had ever before been in a picture.

For four years Roosevelt and Denis trained them for the dramatic story, a story with a vision and magni-

ficence which makes it one of the great attractions of the season.

Roosevelt, a cousin of the late Theodore Roosevelt, is a scholarly explorer who has produced pictures in various parts of the world. Denis, research engineer for the Eastman Kodak Company, has been an adventurer all his life. When the two settled on Bali they had no intention of making a motion picture, but they were so taken up with the primitive beauty of the magic island, the little figures of the natives and their finely formed faces that they decided to remain and bring back to civilization the real story of a glorious people.

Cavalcade at Liberty, Sunday

When Noel Coward, brilliant young English writer, launched his "sensational stage success," "Cavalcade," dramatic critics said he had borrowed from the technique of making films. He had used kaleidoscopic symbolism, the close-up and panorama. In their screen play of the subject, which opens Sunday at the Liberty Theatre, Fox Films are paying back with interest; they put "Cavalcade" where it really belongs—into the fluent medium of action—the movie.

From the first stroke of New Year 1900, when we meet the Marryot family—mother, father, two tiny sons, and their staff of servants—to the passing of the old year 1932, there is not a spare moment to pause

over the grandeur of the thing. It is a film whose force will go home with people and bring others to the theatre.

There is no sermonizing; just a vivid panorama hitting off the trend of national and social life of the past thirty years, and pulsating with a story of motherly devotion and youthful passion, of false hopes and thwarted love. There is something unforgettable in the mammoth crowds. Never has any great screen production had so much to offer. There is something for everybody in this pulsing, searching, accusing, enervating drama of the twentieth century—and of the generation that was sacrificed for a future we still have to make secure.
