comforted the man of her choice and to her the whole community pours out its sympathy in this dark hour when all earthly affairs seem to be crashing at her feet.

He is also survived by two sisters and three brothers — Mrs. Eunice Schroeder, of Florence; Mrs. Annie Von Pegert, of Orland, Calif., neither of whom were able to be here for the funeral; P. W. Laird, of Myrtle Point; Geo. P. Laird, of Bandon, and W. C. Laird, of Honolulu. Besides these are scores of cousins and relatives all over this end of the county who will sadly miss the counsel of one whom they trusted. Mrs. Laird's son, Lloyd, who took Mr. Laird's name when a small boy, also survives him.

For many years Mr. Laird was head sawyer at the lumber mill at Johnson's Mill up the river. He also drove stage for a year from Empire to Roseburg, when the roads were trails in this country, and then for a number of years owned and operated the ranch in the Roy district, now the Kime ranch.

In 1915 the ranch was sold and they have lived in Coquille, their last home being the beautiful place on Third street. And it was beautiful, due in great measure to the untiring effort Jim made to have it so. He was a great lover of flowers and his greatest delight was in planting and bringing to perfection the floral plants with which he surrounded his home. His lawn for years has been the best groomed and most beautiful in Coquille.

But Jim had qualities of spirit which were more endearing than even his love of home perfection. It can be said without the slightest fear of contradiction that he had more friends in Coquille than any one else in the city. Everyone who knew him was his friend and that acquaintanceship was general throughout the county. To this writer his passing comes as a very personal loss for Jim was as dear a friend as we have had.

He was always active in local affairs, a progressive citizen who sought the improvement of his city, the schools, and the advancement of every worth while county project.

A democrat of conviction, he had never sought office but was content to advance the interests of his friends.

He was a member of the Masonic degree and Eastern Star chapter here, of the Knights-Templar at Marshfield, of Al Kader Shrine, and of Coquille Lodge No. 53, I. O. O. F.

We shall miss him; his cheerful smile was always an inspiration in dark days; but we know he has gone to that fairer and better land where he will be waiting to welcome his loved ones from earth to heaven.

"The Aftermath"

The Christian Women of Coquille have secured Messrs. Hall and Summers to deliver "The Aftermath," a fast-moving, epochal, two-character, religious, temperance drama, next Wednesday, June 21, at 7:30 p. m. in Pioneer Hall. No admission, but a silver offering will be taken.

This is the episode of a cycle of two similar programs previously delivered over America. The other two were "Wets vs. Dries" and "The Judge and the Dope Peddler."

The present economic chaos and the return to life of the liquor problem that confronts voters now, caused many of the friends of Hall and Summers to persuade them to re-enter the arena and devise a new vehicle to present up-to-date conditions in drama form. The result was "The Aftermath."

Henry B. Hall, son of his illustrious, deceased father, is a young and forceful speaker in his early thirties. Judge M. C. Summers, former public prosecutor and founder of the Court of General Sessions of St. Louis, Mo., has a national reputation as one of America's ablest orators. Both are actors par excellence. In "The Aftermath" they have created a vehicle that calls for both argumentative and histrionic ability that few speakers or actors possess.

Characters: Tom O'Neil, in the liquor business, and Judge Wood, Judge of the Superior Court. Scene: The Judge's Chamber.

The scene opens with the Judge in his chamber reading the morning newspaper regarding an automobile accident, in which the drunken driver was killed.

Tom O'Neil enters in quest of a license for his new drink emporium. The Judge and O'Neil discuss joyfully the wet victory of the recent election. The conversation finally leads up to the newspaper account of the automobile accident, of which O'Neil was the only eye witness. O'Neil then discloses that there was a girl in the accident also. We prefer to leave the drama from this point as a surprise to the audience, for it strikes into the very hearts and homes of every person.

What takes place from there on has gone down in Prohibition history as the most complete, dramatic, humorous, pathetic, colorful and cyclonic presentation of the liquor problem that has ever been presented on the American platform.

"Pussyfoot" Johnson Spoke

"We entered the war to make the world safe for democracy; the cry now is 'make the United States safe for war,'" was the opening remark of Pussyfoot Johnson at the Community Building here last Friday evening, and he proceeded to score the hysteria which has swayed so great a portion of our population the past year or two in the attempt to wipe the prohibition laws off the statute books and legalize the sale of liquor.

There was a good-sized crowd in attendance to hear Mr. Johnson, Thomas W. Gales and R. E. Close, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon, all of whom spoke against repeal and urged Coquille to line up with the dry forces of the state.

Referring to the methods of handling liquor in Canada, England, Sweden, Mr. Johnson pointed out that there was from four to eight times as many arrests in the leading cities of these countries for drunkenness, as there are in New York city, the most flagrant violator of liquor laws in the United States.

The brewers and distilleries promise to put the speak-easies out of business. Mr. Johnson stated, if repeal carries, doing it by competition, but he ridiculed the idea that they wanted to see the speak-easies abolished.

Another question he asked was who is furnishing the immense sums that are promised for the government from the taxation of beer. His answer, "Now, as always, those least able to pay it."

In Munich, Germany, the beer capital of the world, there are 10,000 confirmed drinkers. "Do we want to compete for a like distinction?"
