Celebrated Golden Wedding

The only apology the Sentinel has
to offer for being so late in publishing
an account of a golden wedding an-
niversary is that Dr. Bloyd did not
tell us about it at the time. The fol-
lowing account appeared in a publica-
tion of Oakland, Calif., last month:

On Saturday, April 29, a very pleas-
ant event took place at the home of
Mr. and Mrs. William Ziegler, Hills-
boro, Oregon, the occasion being the
celebration of the golden wedding an-
niversary of Dr. and Mrs. Clarence R.
Bloyd, of Coquille, Oregon.

After a dinner, at which 15 were
seated, many relatives and friends cal-
led to extend congratulations and best
wishes to the happy couple. They were
the recipients also of a large number
of beautiful gifts and a shower of mes-
sages from those who were unable to
attend. The evening was devoted to
music and singing and a number of
readings by friends.

Dr. Bloyd and his wife are both na-
tive Oregonians and have resided in
this state practically the entire time,
with the exception of about ten years
spent at Anacortes, Washington,
after their marriage.

Dr. Bloyd was born November 21,
1861, in a little house in the vicinity
of S. W. Clay and Chapman Streets,
Portland, near which a large elder used
to stand; but this identifying landmark
has evidently been hewn down, as no
trace of it can be found. The neigh-
borhood used to be known as "Irish
Flats." His parents, William A. and
Sarah C. Bloyd, settled here from
Toungait Green, Ill., in 1852. His mother
died when Clarence was just a little
shaver of about three. He lived in
various places, Linkville (now Klamath
Falls), Roseburg and Lake City, Calif.,
until young manhood when he drifted
out towards Hillsboro where he met
and won Elzada A. Butler, a daughter
of Isaac and Labitha Butler, whose do-
nation land claim is now the town of
Orengo, and where Mrs. Bloyd was

born, October 23, 1857, and spent her
girlhood. Mr. and Mrs. Butler migrated
to Oregon with a party of immi-
grants from Missouri, crossing the
plains, via Meek's Cut-off in central
Oregon, with an ox team in the year
1845. As a bit of early history, Mr.
Butler assisted Peter Skeen Ogden in
the reburial of the remains of Narcissa
Whitman, at Wallatpu, near Walla-
Walla, Washington.

The well known "Jimmy" Campbell,
of near Hillsboro, united Dr. and Mrs.
Bloyd in marriage in the year 1883. To
this union were born six children: Miss-
es Zoia A. and Lucy A., of near Banks;
Mrs. C. S. Townsend, of Portland; Mrs.
W. D. Hoag and Mrs. William F. Zieg-
ler of Hillsboro; and C. V. Bloyd, of
Marshfield, all of whom, with their
respective husbands and wives were
present at the reunion. There were
also six grandchildren.

Mr. Bloyd has been a doctor of Chi-
ropodiatry and Chiropody for 22 years.
For the past 14 years they have re-
sided in Coquille, Oregon, where he
also has a 640 acre sheep ranch as a
hobby.
