Hay Fever

(Oregon State Board of Health)
It is estimated that from three to
five per cent of the population suffers
from hypersensitiveness to pollen or
other substances. About half of
them have hay fever. This indicates
that at least 2,500,000 in the United
States suffer from this disease, two
thousand of whom live in Oregon. It
is worth while to consider the prob-
lem seriously from the standpoint of
discomfort also but there are other
features of the disease which are
more important.

About thirty per cent of hay fever
patients if untreated, eventually de-
velop asthma, which as a rule lasts
for a few weeks during the height of
the season but may be prolonged into
October and November. A number of
these asthmatics eventually develop
perennial asthma and are more or less
crippled for years. Many patients
also develop infection of the nasal
sinus which may persist off and on
throughout life. Chronic bronchitis,
pleurisy, pneumonia and other chest
complications may develop from
chronic sinusitis, each resulting origi-
nally from an apparently mild hay
fever. The average untreated hay
fever patient suffers from 40 to 70
days annually. This does not neces-
sarily cause absence from work but
it does decrease efficiency.

There are three groups of pollen
producers which cause more than 90
per cent of the cases in the north-west-
ern states. The first are trees which
pollinate from early March until the
end of April. They account for ten per
cent of the cases. The second group
is the various grasses and a few
weeds, for example plantain and
sheep sorrel which pollinate from mid
April until mid July. Up to forty
per cent of patients are affected by
these. The third group includes
plants which pollinate during the au-
tumn months. In cities an effective
way to deal with weeds that cause
hay fever is to organize a campaign
for their destruction. Fortunately
the ragweed does not flourish in Ore-
gon.

To discover which pollen the pa-
tient is sensitive to, saline extracts
are made of the various common wind
borne pollens and the patient's skin
is tested with these. He is then given
subcutaneous injections of the extract
in gradually increasing doses. The
injections should begin six to ten
weeks before the usual onset of sym-
ptoms so that by the time the pollen
is in the air the patient will have built
up a relative immunity. If the treat-
ments are properly administered, the
results are successful in eighty per
cent of the cases. Complicating asth-
ma and sinus infections are corres-
pondingly diminished. The protec-
tion offered the mucus membrane
from pollen irritation lessens the
danger of bacterial infection and
greatly diminishes the number of win-
ter colds. The only possible objection
to the treatment is the occurrence of
so-called constitutional reaction fol-
lowing about one per cent of the in-
jections. Such reaction can easily be
controlled by an injection of adrenal
in chloride. Unfortunately very few
patients are cured after a single ses-
sion's treatment. Continuing the
treatment the year round seems to
give better results and is more apt to
effect a permanent cure.

Additional News from Capital

Seven members of the last legisla-
ture are candidates for seats in the
constitutional convention which will
pass on the question of repeal of the
18th amendment. Senator Staples of
Multnomah county and Representa-
tive Clarke of Douglas are lined up on
the dry side of the controversy, with
Representatives Kelley of Jackson,
Snider of Lake, and Beckman, Dam-
masch and Hall of Multnomah on the
wet side of the argument.

State Treasurer Holman is taking
the initiative in a move which he hopes
will result in some highly beneficial
reforms in Oregon's state government.
He is asking 15 prominent Oregon
citizens to undertake the job of mak-
ing a study of the present state or-
ganization and to present its findings,
together with recommendations for
consolidations and eliminations, to the
next legislature. Holman in recent
public addresses has been particu-
larly critical of obsolescence, duplication
and sinecures in the present state
government. The correction of this
situation, he believes, would result in
a material reduction of governmental
costs with no lessening of the efficien-
cy with which public functions are be-
ing administered. He hopes to over-
come any opposition which may arise
to proposed reorganization of depart-
ments and institutions by interesting
a committee of sufficient prominence
and influence to force through its
recommendation in spite of opposi-
tion of boards, commissions and in-
dividual officials upon whose toes the
proposed reforms might tread.

The \$15,000 appropriated by the
last legislature as the state's share in
the cost of the forthcoming special
election was only a drop in the bucket.
The heavy end of the burden will fall
on the counties which must foot the
bill for clerk hire, rental of polling
places and printing of the ballots.
Dave O'Hara, elections clerk in the
state department, estimates that the
cost of the July election will approxi-
mate \$75,000 of which at least \$60,-
000 will fall on the counties. But in
the end it all comes out of the same
pocket, that of the taxpayer who
foots the bill for both the county and
state expense.

In spite of heavy pruning of dead-
wood from the registration list fol-
lowing the last general election more
than 16,000 voters' pamphlets have
been returned to the state depart-
ment because of inability of the post-
al department to deliver the mail.
Most of the returned pamphlets
were marked "moved," but many of
those whose names appear on the
registration lists have died since the
November election.

Steadily increasing commodity
prices are reflected in bids being sub-
mitted for state supplies. Meat for
the state institutions will cost about
20 per cent more than bids submitted
six months ago. Dry goods prices
show an advance of approximately
25 per cent and flour prices on which
bids will be opened next month are
expected to show an even greater in-
crease in cost.

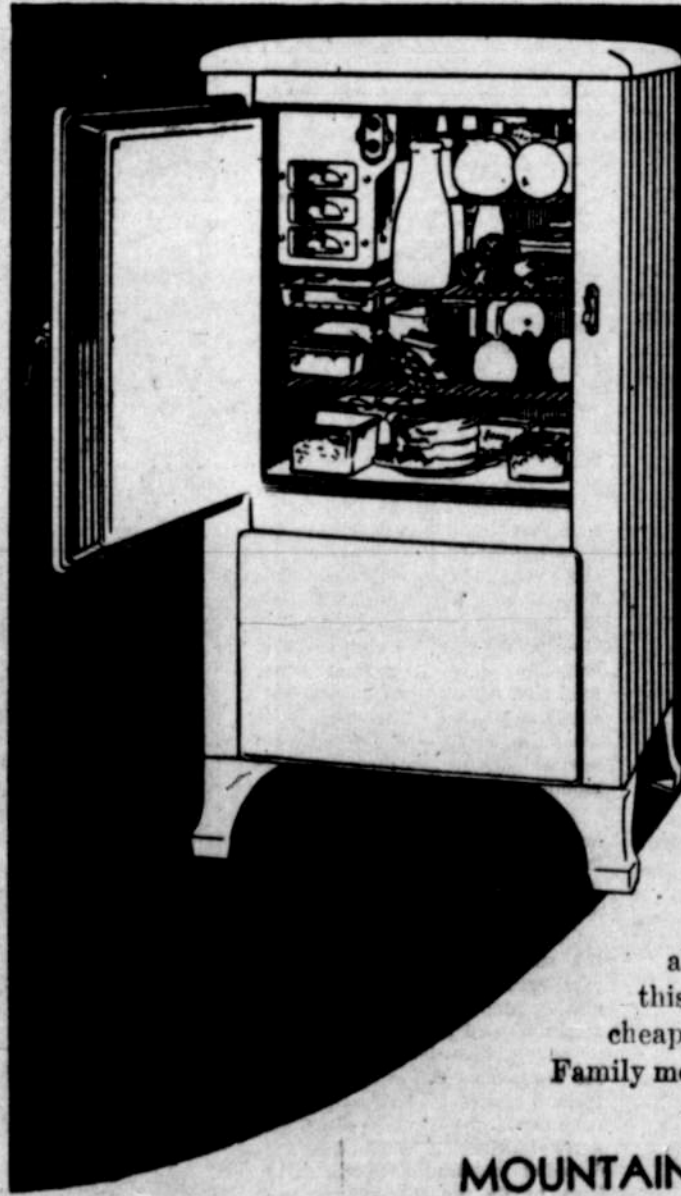
