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Sidney Cadman Makes Good Smith-Hughes Record

Sidney Cadman, who entered Coquille High School last fall as a freshman, is getting a good start in the business of farming. He took the Smith-Hughes Agricultural course and chose as his project Dairy Animals and Swine. These enterprises forced him to add another enterprise, that of farm crops, for Sidney intends to grow all the feed for his animals.

Before entering high school Sidney was an outstanding 4-H club boy and won a purebred Holstein calf as a prize in the that work. He also won a two-weeks' course of instruction at the Oregon State College. While at the college he placed second in swine judging and second in crop judging competition with over two hundred other boys.

Since entering Smith-Hughes work he has added two junior yearling purebred Holsteins to his herd. These animals were purchased at Mount Angel and are of the best breed in the state. Sidney has shown them both at the Coos and Curry county fair and at the state fair and has consistently won ribbons on all his entries.

Last fall he decided to raise hogs. He selected the Duroc Jersey breed and sent to Dufur, Oregon, for his foundation stock, which consisted of one purebred sow. Her first litter gave him 12 pigs. He then secured from Dufur also a purebred boar. His project now consists of three sows and two boars. From the three sows he has raised an average litter of nine pigs for each sow. During the winter he has marketed 3,150 pounds of pork, receiving top prices for all that he sold.

It is Sidney's ambition to develop a type of Duroc Jersey that will be especially adapted to Coos county conditions.

In order to keep from inbreeding he intends to purchase a gilt of a

different strain from a California breeder this fall.

To feed these animals he has worked out the following crop rotation, oats and vetch, oats and field peas, rape, carrots, corn and soy beans and artichokes.

That these Smith-Hughes students, trained in agriculture, will be the rural leaders of the future is inevitable. Sidney is a member of the Coquille Grange and treasurer of the local chapter of Future Farmers of America, which is a national organization for all farm boys who are enrolled in Smith-Hughes agricultural work.
