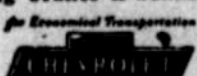

The Coos Cranberry Co-operative is the name of the new association organized last Saturday evening in Marshfield by the cranberry growers of southwestern Oregon. Oregon Convention Repeals

The Oregon Constitutional convention made short work of voting for repeal of the 18th amendment to the U. S. constitution last Monday when they met in the hall of representatives at Salem. The delegates were in session slightly more than two hours.

The vote to adopt the 21st amendment which repeals the 18th was 110 to 5.

A motion that it be the sense of the convention that laws prohibiting the return of the saloon in Oregon, was made by Mrs. C. S. Jackson, of Portland, but it was not even put to a vote as a motion to adjourn was immediately made.

Twenty-one states have now voted for repeal.
