ical treatment.

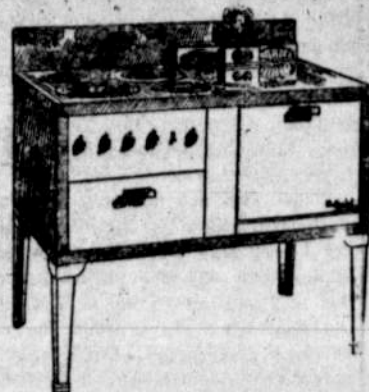
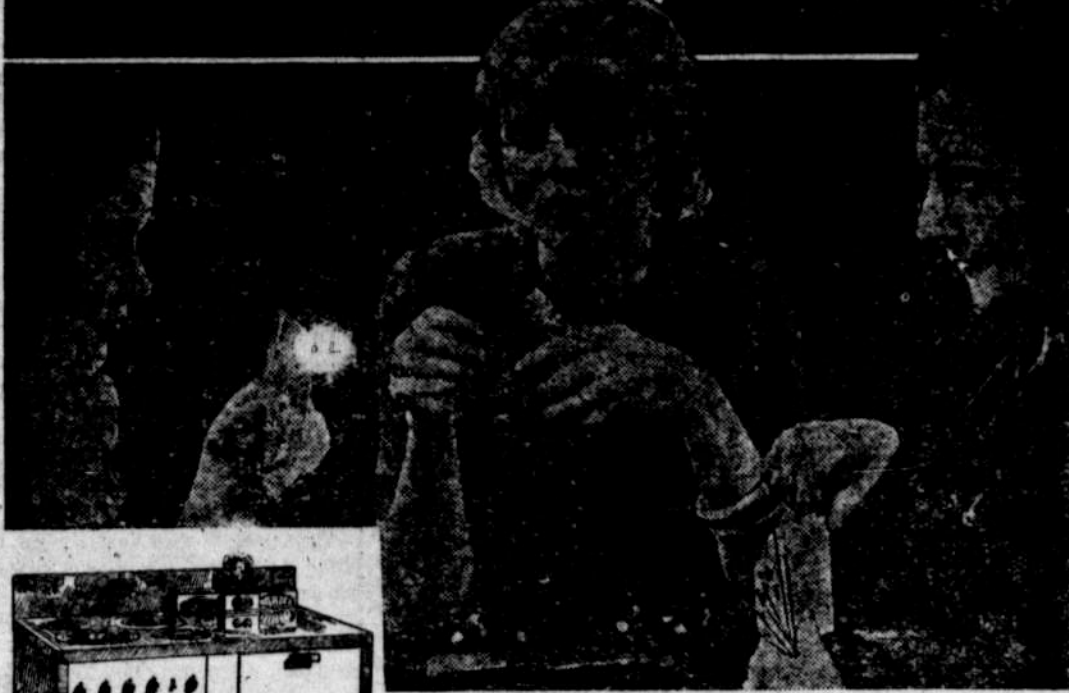

The full cooperation of the gas and
electric utility industry in the Presi-
dent's Emergency Reemployment Pro-
gram was promised to National Re-
covery Administrator Hugh S. John-
son by a committee consisting of
George B. Cortelyou, President of Edi-
son Electric Institute, Floyd L. Car-
lisle, Chairman of the Special Code
Committee of the Institute, and Her-
man Russell, Chairman of the Special
Code Committee of the American Gas
Association.

In view of the fact that the utilities
are service industries in continuous
operation day and night, some modifi-
cation of the President's Reemploy-
ment agreement was discussed and
the committee was requested by Gen-
eral Johnson to bring in their code as
soon as possible in order that the pro-
visions covering these special condi-
tions may be substituted for the pro-
visions in the standard agreement,
thereby entitling the members of the
industries to receive the Blue Eagle
upon execution of the modified agree-
ment.

General Johnson stated his satis-
faction with the expressed desire of
these industries to cooperate one
hundred per cent in the movement to
increase mass purchasing power and
spread employment.
