Marines to Continue Recruiting

The U. S. Marine Corps is to continue recruiting to maintain a strength of 15,000 men, according to instructions received by Captain H. N. Stent, Marine Corps recruiting officer at Portland, Oregon.

Captain Stent states that due to the large number of re-enlistments each district has been placed on a restricted allowance basis for new enlistments. Approximately 20 enlistments have been authorized each month from the states of Oregon, Idaho and southern Washington. Men selected must be of excellent character and able to furnish references, minimum height and age for acceptance has been set at 68 inches and 18 years, respectively.

All men accepted for first enlistment are sent to the Marine Corps Base at San Diego, Calif. for training. Men who have had previous service will be transferred to the Marine Barracks, Puget Sound, Bremerton,

Washington.

The Marine Corps recruiting station is now located at 208 new Federal Court Building, Sixth and Main street, Portland, Oregon.

Student Expense at U. of O. Drops 25 Per Cent

In a time of rising prices, it is encouraging to note that the costs of attendance at the University will be much lower this year. Recent figures show that the drop in a student's normal expense at the University for 1933-34 will be more than 25 per cent under 1932-33.

The University registration fees have been reduced \$6 a term, \$18 a year. The breakage and loss deposit (returnable) will be \$5 instead of \$10. Board and room, at the dormitories, will cost about \$210 for the year compared with \$300 for 1932-33.

Estimated total expenses for a student in the coming year stand at \$411, compared with \$547 last year. Many students, by "batching," working for room or meals, etc., will get by for even less.
