"Back to Nature" Picture Coming to Liberty Theatre Tonight
---"Midnight Mary" Also Tonight---"College Humor" Sunday

Powers CCC Boys Have Big Road Building Job

The Powers Camp of the CCC organization on the Siskiyou Forest is one of the toughest jobs of road building on the Forest. This piece of road is up the Coquille river from the Forest boundary for four or five miles, and is part of the main road that will extend from Powers to Agness when finished. It has been passed up by the Forest Service for a number of years because the construction costs are so heavy that very little mileage would be obtained from the small allotments that were available to the Forest in years past. However, under this arrangement, it was felt that this was an opportune time to secure the construction of this piece of road because it was the key location to the entire road system north of the Rogue river.

The principal difficulties are bluffs of solid rock, but by patient and tedious location work, and the stretching of standard grades, a location has been decided upon, which it is hoped to have cut through by spring. Along with this piece of road, this camp has 17 miles of telephone line to build, 22 miles of roadway, 23 miles of trail, four temporary dwellings, three tool houses, 19 bridges, an equipment shed at Powers, besides the maintenance of some 85 miles of telephone line, 200 miles of horse trail, and the boundary survey of 43 miles of Forest boundary.

Because of the difficulties in transportation to the camp site, the camp was not fully organized until early in July. Since then they have been concentrating primarily on the road down the Coquille river, and while they have made a splendid showing for hand work, they are still a long way from opening up that stretch of road into Powers. Some 12 to 20 miles of telephone line have been maintained, which means the cutting out of all interfering brush, and hanging the wire up in good condition. About 30 miles of trail have been maintained, and three new lookout buildings constructed. Many of the jobs listed for this camp could not be completed this year, due to restrictions on the location of spike camps. It is hoped that another season these camps will be possible, and jobs farther away from the main camp may be completed.

The camp is located about eight miles up the Coquille river from Powers at a place known as China Flat. A road was built to this site by Pepper Bros. for mining purposes. While this road is exceptionally steep, it has served as a summer road, but cannot be used during the winter time, owing to its unsurfaced condition, and also to the fact that a pontoon bridge across the Coquille river, which is possible to use during the summer, will be taken out when the first heavy rains come in the fall.

Major Ward was in charge of the camp until recently, and now Frank C. Ringland is in command. J. B. Parker is the camp superintendent, and the camp is comprised principally of local woodsmen and enrolled men from Illinois. They have one of the most beautiful camp sites on the Forest, and it would be maintained as a winter camp were it not for the fact that road conditions are impossible after the heavy rains.

Auto Accident at Gaylord

Two men were injured and a car was wrecked as the result of an accident on the Powers road Tuesday.

O. H. Robison, owner and driver of the auto, accompanied by Jesse Hayes and Charles Wagner, struck a patch of loose gravel on the road near the John Grant ranch at Gaylord Tuesday night and went over a 20-foot embankment, totally wrecking the machine.

Robison and Hayes were taken to Mast hospital, where their wounds were dressed. Mr. Robison suffered a broken nose and an injured face and jaw; Mr. Hayes received a badly bruised shoulder. Both remained in the hospital overnight, but were able to return to their homes Wednesday morning. Wagner escaped without injury.—Myrtle Point Herald.
