W. C. T. U. County Convention

At the all-day W. C. T. U. county meeting, held in the Christian church here on Tuesday, Mrs. C. C. Farr was re-elected as county chairman and all other officers who had served the past year were again chosen. Mrs. Jas. Richmond is vice president; Mrs. Delbert Loree, of Bandon, recording secretary; Mrs. Wm. Phillips, of Marshfield, treasurer; and Mrs. F. G. Leslie, corresponding secretary.

As delegates to the state W. C. T. U. convention in Portland, Oct. 17 to 20, Mrs. Felix Hull, of Bandon, Mrs. Wm. Phillips, of Marshfield, Mrs. Delbert Doree, of Bandon, Mrs. C. C. Farr and Mrs. Fred Schaefer, of Coquille, were chosen, with Mrs. F. G. Leslie as alternate.

Death from Eating Mussels

One man is dead and three others narrowly escaped death from eating mussels found at Brush Creek below Port Orford last Sunday. Delos Gardiner, a resident of the Four Mile country below Bandon, is the one who succumbed and his son, John, Bill Hart and W. H. Cummings are those who were saved by prompt medical attention at the hospital in Bandon.

Hart and Cummings, who are prospectors, brought the mussels to the Gardiner ranch and said they were going to use them for fishing. Mr. Gardiner said that mussels were good to eat and after cooking them, all four men proceeded to eat a quantity.

They soon became patially paralyzed, and could not control their actions nor feet. Getting into their car they drove to Bandon where the night officer was preparing to arrest John Gardiner for drunken driving, his car moving erratically all over the street. He could hardly articulate by that time but managed to make it plain that all were sick and needed to see a doctor. Delos Gardiner, it was found, had died on the eight-mile trip to Bandon.

Doctors Lucas and Gail, whom Deputy Sheriff Wm. Davis interviewed in the course of an investigation, told the officer that the mussels were poisonous because they were above the level where they were immersed every day by the rising tide.

served them at noon, thence to Myrtle Point and back to Coquille by four o'clock.

In all three of the valley towns they visited industrial plants, stopped at A. T. Morrison's cranberry bog near Bandon, inspected the Ford and Cadman 70 acres of peas near Cedar Point, and were ready for the 5:15 luncheon in the hotel here.

R. L. Stewart, president of the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, introduced Mayor J. Arthur Berg who in a few words gave the 46 diners in attendance a most cordial welcome, and then turned the meeting over to C. D. Porter, who called on several of the Portland visitors for talks. Those who responded were E. R. Wiggins, Eddie Weinbaum, L. T. Hays, D. C. Freeman and B. F. Irvine, the beloved editor of the Oregon Journal.

In his usual heart-touching manner, Mr. Irvine told how he considered Coquille as almost a home, how happy the people of this section should be in the enjoyment of the natural advantages, in which Coos county abounds, and as did all the rest of the speakers, here and at the Bay, pledged Portland's co-operation in whatever the Coos empire attempts to promulgate.

Especially was this true in regard to the five assured bridges on the Coast Highway, and one speaker, Mr. Wiggins, stated that within 30 days a contract would be let for the first of the five and that the others would follow in regular order. It is hoped to have all completed by the end of 1935.

He also gave unstinted praise to the brand of weather displayed on Wednesday, besides urging the whole coast county to boost and boost and boost for tourist travel along the coast.

Mr. Weinbaum extended the visitors' thanks and appreciation for the many courtesies shown them on their two days' visit to the county.

Championship Tournament On

The big battle of the year—the championship tournament—is under way. The opening guns were fired last Sunday and an enthusiastic army has entered the field for the first skirmish.
