Surrounded by one of the largest casts in her long career, Mary Pickford comes to the Liberty Theatre on Sunday for three days in "Secrets," an adaptation of the celebrated stage play by Rudolph Besier and May Edgington. "Secrets" gives Miss Pickford what she believes is an ideal vehicle. In the first place, it is "motion picture" from beginning to end, and in the second place the story is a simple one of love and elemental emotions, with no wise-cracking and no sophistication. It is Miss Pickford's sincere belief that simple tales, simply told, will be the salvation of the screen, just as they are bound to be in literature.

An unusual solution to the problem of training delinquent youths in the state reformatory is offered in the Warner Bros. picture, "The Mayor of Hell," James Cagney's latest starring picture at the Liberty Theatre tonight and Saturday.
