Certified Seed Doubles Yield

The yield of potatoes on his farm on Larson Inlet was more than doubled by using certified Burbank seed as compared with uncertified local grown seed, according to A. Grossen of North Bend. Not only was the yield more than doubled by using certified seed but the quality of the potatoes was better, being more uniform in size, and smooth.

A similar increase in yield and improved quality was obtained by Dave Rice who also operates a farm on Larson Inlet.

The growing of certified potatoes by these two men was part of the program sponsored by the agricultural committee of the North Bay Side grange working in co-operation with the county agent's office.

Potato improvement work was also included in the program sponsored by the agricultural committee of the Fairview grange and the work in each community is an example of agricultural benefits to the community sponsored by the grange.
