Barbara Stanwyck in the Warner Bros. picture "Baby Face," the attraction on the screen of the Liberty Theatre today and tomorrow, is a warm, vibrant, gorgeously clad red-headed baby face, gold-digger.

In this production Barbara appears in quite a different type of role to anything she has played recently. Gone are drab clothes of "Ladies They Talk About," "The Purchase Price" and "So Big." Barbara bursts out in the gayest of butterfly raiment in her part as a successful gold digger de luxe.

Barbara herself likes silks and satins best. They raise her spirits and give her a feeling of joyousness, she says, just as cottons and woollens depress her.

In "Baby Face" Barbara is a vamp extraordinary, bending twelve different men to her will and discarding them as fast as they have served her purpose in climbing to luxury. Ruthlessly she flits from one lover to another.

The presence of one white woman in a jungle village populated by desperadoes and derelicts results in a mad maelstrom of passion and revenge in the Columbia production, "Fury in the Jungle," which runs as the preview Saturday night.

Peggy Shannon is the lovely English girl who unwittingly incites this whirlpool. Donald Cook, an escaped convict, and Dudley Digges, a drunken doctor, constitute themselves her unwilling bodyguards, but even they

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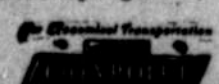
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
