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Bandon Poultry Show a Success—Cecil Laws a Winner

One of the most successful poultry shows Bandon has ever seen came to a close Sunday night, when owners of more than 400 birds checked over their cash awards, prizes, and trophy banners and left for their various homes.

J. B. Legett, Rhode Island breeder of Canby, Oregon, Mrs. H. C. Klein-smith of Canby, with Barred Rocks, P. A. Gent, of Eugene, with production White Leghorns, and other well-known breeders were high in their praise of the management of the show and enthusiastic over the quality of the birds here.

The Grand Champion bird of the show was a massive Rhode Island Red cockerel owned by J. B. Legett, of Canby, and already winner of grand championship honors at the Pacific International. This bird was bought by William Sweet, of Bandon, to head the first prize young pen which he purchased from E. H. Chamberlain, Bandon poultryman. Numerous other inquiries were made, and indications point to a brisk demand for hatching eggs this spring, according to Irving C. Rosevoid, secretary.

Birds from as far as Salt Lake City—White Wyandottes, exhibited by Walter E. Coe, carried the fame of the Bandon show back to the Mormon town. Jens F. Svith, former Smith-Hughes instructor and poultry show secretary, sent over a fine group of Light Brahma and Golden Laced Wyandottes from Klamath Falls. Portland, Eugene, Springfield and other valley towns sent numerous entries to add to the local list.

Bandon breeders fared exceptionally well, despite the strong competition, and took many coveted honors. Chas. F. Winters, show president, won the trophy banner for the best pullet in the exhibition class and a special award for the best bird in the English class with his Australorp cockerel.

A. A. Henry and Ivan Bowman were both heavy winners in the Wyandotte breed. Owen Winters won on White Rocks and Arlo Duncan made it interesting for the Kleinsmith Barred Rocks. A. W. Kaping, W. A. Heard, Geo. Merchant and others provided plenty of competition for Cecil Laws, of Coquille, Kaps Poultry Farm, North Bend, P. A. Gant and other Leghorn breeders.

Cecil Laws' entries were very much in evidence with ribbons of all colors, from white to blue. In the Jersey White Giant class he won all awards.

In the single comb White Leghorn class he had 1st and 2nd and 3rd pullet, 1st young breeding pen. Among the S. C. Black Minorcas he won first, third and fourth hen. His Silver Laced Wyandottes won all awards; and in the S. C. White Leghorns he won nine ribbons, the prizes being for 2nd cock, 2nd, 3rd and 4th cockerel, 3rd and 4th hen, 4th pullet, 1st young breeding pen, 1st and 3rd young laying pen. The best young breeding pen of light birds was his S. C. White Leghorn pen.

Club Work in Curry County Shows Gain in 1933

A two hundred per cent increase in 4-H membership in Curry county marked the close of another successful year, according to a summary just issued by H. C. Seymour, state club leader. Last year Curry county had 12 clubs and this year 29, or better than 100 per cent increase in number of clubs. Last year there were 108 enrolled and this year 293. Last year 76 members completed and this year 210. This shows a decided increase in percentage of completion, as well as in numbers.

The total value of all these projects was \$2,639.51. The total profit was \$1,032.47. The county-wide potato club was the outstanding successful club from the standpoint of profit. The seven boys engaged in this project netted \$403.75. The outstanding member in this club was Donald Zum-wack, of Sixes, who produced 190 sacks of No. 1 potatoes on approximately two-thirds of an acre. His net returns were \$172.03.

The next group of clubs deserving mention was that of the garden project. Twenty-three members completed, with a profit of \$289.98.

Lois Brown, of Langlois, was the outstanding Calf Club member and was awarded the George Hampton Special for being the outstanding Jersey club member in Coos and Curry counties at the county fair. This award consisted of a fine registered heifer calf which is of excellent breeding, coming from the Hampton herd. Lois now has four registered females.

The sewing club girls made 209 articles, valued at \$70.83.

Only one sheep club was organized and it finished 100 per cent with seven members and a profit of \$18.12. These junior sheepmen did not make very much profit, but neither did any other sheepmen. They did, however, win more than their share of honors at the Curry County Fat Lamb and Wool Show. Irwin Johnson, of Port-

Orford, took first place on a fleece taken from one of his ewes, in a class of 31 fleeces. The sheepmen of this section are behind this club project, especially for the building of their annual show.

From all indications, the 4-H club people of Curry county will live up to their motto, "Make the Best Better," with the idea of increasing enrollment, percentage of completions, and profits, next year.
