New Road Gives Protection

Construction of a forest protection road that will facilitate the protection of more than a billion feet of fine timber has been the program of 1649th Company, CCC, at Camp McKinley for the past seven months. Already the boys have completed six of the fifteen miles of the road from McKinley to Tioga, their objective point.

A geological scramble of rocky ledges, shifting rock and loose boulders has held up the pace of construction, but it is estimated by road engineers of the forestry group that most of the tough going has been passed.

The instant purpose of the road is fire protection for this valuable stretch of forest has not had adequate protection in the past. Rare rich myrtle-woods and Port Orford cedar make up the bulk of the growth. So far the boys of the Civilian Conservation corps have cleared a road long enough to make accessible to fire protection more than three hundred million feet of lumber.

Besides the territory's value as a timber country, its natural resources make it ideal for hunting, fishing and camping. Brook trout, salmon trout and kindred game fish abound in the Middle Creek, North Fork of the Coquille river, and also the South Fork of the Coos river. Black-tailed deer, small cats and cougar roam the ridges.
