the executives. In the late 1700's and the early 1800's the world was emerging from the darkness of autocracy into the light of democracy, and the early legislators of the U. S. were jealous of encroachment by other governmental functions.

Whether the present trend back toward dictatorship was logical or wise was a matter on which the judge did not comment.

Hon. Dexter Rice, of Roseburg, the last speaker, with his subject, "Law and Lawyers," advised his hearers that a strict compliance with the rules of legal procedure would do more than anything else to bring harmonious relations and confidence between the legal profession and the public. He decried the constant practice of many lawyers to ignore and alter the rules with consequent loss of prestige to themselves and dissatisfaction on the part of their clients.

Mr. Rice invited the Coos Bay Association to attend the memorial service to be held for the late Judge J. W. Hamilton in Roseburg, on Feb. 3, and L. A. Liljeqvist will represent the Coos bar and give a short address. Judge Brand will also be a speaker on that occasion.

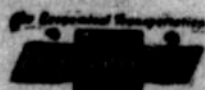
