Council Session Monday Night

The ordinance, which when adopted will grant a franchise to the Mt. States Power Co. by the city of Coquille, was read at Monday night's session of the council and will come up for final passage on April 2. The motion to postpone a vote on it was made by Councilman Lefevre.

The only opposition expressed to the franchise by councilmen is due to its length—ten years. However, it is really only for five years as the city retains the right to cancel it any time after five years.

Under its provisions the city will receive two per cent of the company's gross receipts, except that city, county and school payments are not subject to the two per cent.

The city will also receive free juice at the city hall for lighting up to 2600 kilowatt hours, up to 1600 K. W. at the water works plant for power and lights, and up to 1100 K. W. at the Community Building. On anything over those limits the regular rate will be charged and paid.

Drue Cunningham applied for a permit to have a concrete building constructed on the Holycross lot on Front street. Permission is granted as soon as he files plans and specifications.

Dr. V. L. Hamilton was appointed on the Coquille Boxing Commission to succeed the late Dr. J. W. Wheeler.

A price of \$150 was given to Mrs. Geo. F. Burr for lots 5 and 6, in block 36. Those are the lots underneath the south end of the Henry street bridge in which the city has \$168 invested for taxes and street improvements.

Street Committee Authorized

The street committee was authorized to order such repairs as may be needed on the sidewalk along the highway, leading to the high school building.

Upon the request of the State Liquor Commission, the council recommended that licenses for the sale of beer be granted to W. H. Fortier, Lefe Compton, Mrs. R. L. Walker and K. L. Staninger.

School Boys to Visit Coquille

Today and Saturday, March 23 and 24, the Coquille Chapter of Future Farmers of America will entertain representatives of the Smith-Hughes Agricultural department from the following schools: Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Malin, Merrill, Henley, Myrtle Point, Bandon and Coos River, the occasion being the annual Smith-Hughes contests for Southern Oregon.

At this time the boys will compete in skill contests such as milk-testing, blacksmithing, rope tying, rafter-cutting, soldering and saw-filing.

Besides these skill contests teams from each school will compete in volleyball and horseshoe pitching.

Of special interest will be the extemporaneous speaking contest to be held in the High School gymnasium Friday night at eight p. m. From this contest the best speaker will be selected to represent Southern Oregon district at Salem in the state contest. Last year this honor went to Bill Floten of Coquille. The winner of the state contest will represent Oregon at Salt Lake City, Utah, in

the regional contests. The winner of the regional contest will compete for a \$1000.00 cash prize at Kansas City, Missouri, in the national contest.

The purpose of these sectional contests is to develop skill in manual work, to give the boys an opportunity of meeting boys from other schools and to develop each boy in public speaking. There is no charge and a large attendance of the public will be appreciated.

County C. of C. to Issue Booklets

The Coos County Chamber of Commerce which met at Marshfield Monday evening, passed a resolution, addressed to the county court of Coos and Josephine counties, the state highway commission, the forest service and the bureau of public roads, asking that the Powers-Grants Pass road be made of standard width and construction.

The CCC boys at Powers will have the road from there to Illahe graded some time this summer, a distance of 16 miles, leaving only 12 to 15 miles from Illahe to the end of the Alameda road at the other end to bring to grade.

President G. E. Kreiger announced that the county court had tentatively agreed to finance the publication of Coos county recreational and agricultural booklets out of the budget emergency fund, in conjunction with CWA labor. He added Herbert Brown, of Bandon, and Elton Schroeder, of Myrtle Point to the previously named committee of four, and asked that committee and other members to meet with the county court in the Kelser Hospital at North Bend next Monday. The court will be in session there with Judge Thompson, who is confined there because of his broken hip.

Several community meetings have been held at earlier dates where the program was explained to producers and where they were assisted in signing payment contracts. Approximately 125 signers are expected in the two counties who will receive benefit payment of around \$15,000.

Word has been received at the county agent's office from corn-hog section of the AAA that the final date for signing corn-hog reduction contracts has been set for April 3rd and after that time it will not be possible for producers to sign for benefit payments.

Producers are also urged in this announcement to complete their supporting evidence and other documents in connection with the corn-hog reduction contract before this date.

P. M. Brandt, head of the division of animal industry at the state college, who was present for the organization meeting, in commenting on the dairy program, stated that regional conferences are now being held by the AAA and out of these will probably develop an adjustment program for this industry. While no definite announcement has been made as to what this will include it is thought that a 15 per cent reduction in production will be encouraged. Tubercular cattle will likely be eliminated and encouragement given to the culling of abortion reactors.

April 3rd the Deadline

April 3 is the deadline for signing corn-hog production adjustment contracts in Oregon; it is announced by

the state campaign committee which was given authority from Washington to fix its own closing date. Reports from the counties show that the campaign is well along and that with the exception of one or two places this closing date will require no unusual speeding up.

A definite closing date is essential in fairness to those farmers and those counties that have signed promptly and should not be held back in getting their contracts through and approved, ready for benefit payments, says H. A. Lindgren, chairman of the state committee at Oregon State college. The state board of review must have the whole picture in hand before any considerable part of its work can be completed.

Hog growers who hope for a "second chance" such as has now been given wheat producers who failed to join the control program at first, are likely to be disappointed, it is explained, as the hog contract is only for one year, while the wheat contract is for three years making reopening possible.

Permit Lower Freight Rates

Very little business came before the Tuesday luncheon meeting of the Coquille Chamber of Commerce which was well attended.

The membership went on record approving a bill now pending before congress which, if passed, will enable the Southern Pacific to reduce freight rates to and from the east.

The proposed amendment to the law specifying the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission will limit the rate for a through haul from the east to this coast to the total of the rates between intermediate points. Hereafter the through rate has been higher than the aggregate of rates, as

a measure of help to the Panama Canal, and freight-carrying steamers.

With the railroads now in a position to meet the competition of ocean carriers through the canal, the railroads can go after west bound freight and with the empty cars, westbound, replaced with loaded cars, they will also be in a position to reduce the rates on eastbound freight.

Frank Pook, who met with the directors Tuesday, said that the I. C. C. rates were forced on the railroad as a canal subsidy, and that with the greater leniency shown if the new law is passed, the railroads can meet steamship competition both east and west.
