2. To represent its members in matters pertaining to the granting of permits by and between the Public Utilities Commission.
3. To work for the mutual benefit of all its members and the general public and for the betterment of auto freight and truck business.

Any firm, corporation, or individual who holds a permit as a Common, Contract, or Special Carrier may become a member for this Bureau by paying a small initiation fee.
