Elaborate coronation ceremonies will be held for her the evening of June 4, including a children's pageant having over 400 participants. The Queen Mother was selected on the basis of being one of the most outstanding pioneer women in the state. Her father, John Whiteaker, served as governor from 1859 to 1862.
