Siskiyou Forest Named for a Bob-Tailed Horse

Five score and six years ago Chief Factor Archibald McLeod of the Hudson Bay Company made a journey between California and the Oregon Country. There were no railways or public roads, so the journey was made on horseback along the Indian trails of that early day. A snowstorm overtook the party as it was crossing the mountains, obliterating the trail and other landmarks. All the extra horses of the party strayed away and were lost. Among them was a bobtailed pony, the chief factor's favorite running horse. The travelers named the notch in the mountains where the loss occurred Siskiyou Pass, from a Cree Indian word meaning bob-tailed horse. Not long after, the range of mountains where the pass was located came to be known as the Siskiyou.

The Hudson Bay Company with its fur harvesters of hunters, trappers and traders, gave way to the gold seekers of the mid-fifties. Settlers, fishermen and loggers followed. The valleys were cleared up for ranching. The clearing fires often escaped to the timberland and burned great scars on the forested mountain sides. Then in 1908, eighty years after McLeod's horses wandered off in the snowstorm, a million and a third acres of the rough region of the Coast and Siskiyou ranges in southern Oregon and northern California were set aside by the federal government and the name Siskiyou National Forest applied to the whole area. Today, more than a century after its loss in the mountains, Chief Factor McLeod's bob-tailed running horse is commemorated every time the Siskiyou National Forest is mentioned.

Four New Buses on Run

Of interest to Oregonians is the recent enlargement of the fleet of buses operated by Oregon Motor Stages. Four new and modern buses were purchased last week. The new buses are streamlined and have a new head rest, assuring a maximum of comfort. Oregon Motor Stages is an Oregon company, owned and operated by Robert W. Lemen and Murden A. Reed, pioneers of the bus industry in Oregon, serving the entire Oregon Coast Highway between Portland - Astoria and Crescent City and connecting with the Pacific Greyhound Lines, Redwood Highway route.

The section of Oregon lying along the Pacific ocean is not as well known to Oregonians nor to the myriad of tourists who annually visit Oregon as it should be. Messrs. Lemen and Reed are in no small way responsible for the growing popularity of this route. Through their advertising and attractive displays in other cities they are co-operating in putting our coast highway before the public.
