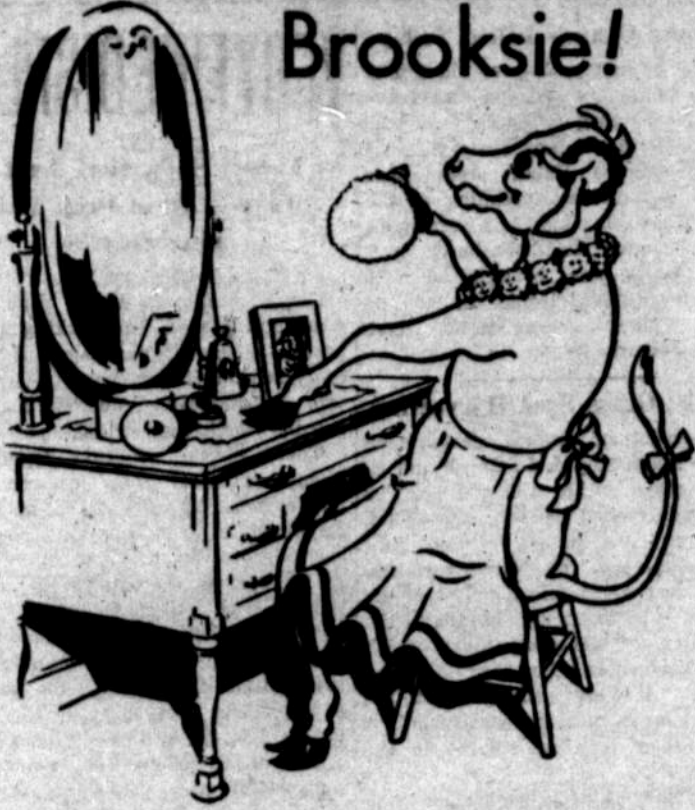


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### MYRTLE POINT ITEMS

### Jury Reform Law in Effect

The jury reform amendment approved by the voters of Oregon at the May election became effective with the official canvass of the vote on June 11, according to Dave O'Mara, chief of the elections division in the state department. The amendment provides that the vote of ten members of a 12-member jury shall be sufficient to return a verdict in any criminal case except one involving a capital crime.

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
