Among the novelties was a Sansari, brought by Mrs. R. A. Wernich. This is a tall decorative plant striped horizontally with white.

Mrs. Geo. Bryant brought an interesting collection of cactus and Mrs. J. P. Beyers had a large collection of succulents and cactus.

The display of miniature gardens, rock gardens, dish gardens and glass gardens was very interesting. This is the first year that glass gardens have been exhibited.

There was only one exhibit of garden craft. Harry Rosa brought a moveable garden seat in the form of a wheelbarrow.

A few words should be said about the decorations. Small fir trees were arranged along the supports of the building and made a cool-looking, effective background for the brilliant flowers and on the stage.

Alton Grimes had a table of named varieties of gladiolus, which were not entered for competition.

And now a suggestion for the next show. While the mood is on us, is the time to begin planning for next year. Even the smallest exhibit requires some foresight and excellent ones considerable planning and painstaking work. Let's start now and try to make every flower show a little better than the one before.
