Forests Closed by Gov. Meier

On June 29 Governor Meier, cognizant of the huge natural resources to be protected by the National Forest and State Associations, signed the following proclamation:

"Whereas, the unregulated use of the following described areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property due to the inflammable debris upon the ground, and also the inaccessibility of much of the territory because of the lack of roads and trails, and such unregulated use of said areas is unlawful;

"All areas within the boundaries of the National Forests in Oregon, except the Siuslaw National Forest, and all timbered lands in the following areas outside the Forest boundaries;

"Adjacent to Umpqua National Forest:

"Sections 1, 2, and 7 to 36, inclusive, T. 26 S., R. 2 W.; and T. 27 S., R. 2 W. and T. 30 and 31 S., R. 2 W.

"Therefore, I, Julius L. Meier, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Chapter 270, Oregon Laws 1933, do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions:

"1. To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas, except on paved or surfaced highways.

"2. To secure permits issued by the Forester or a fire warden before building a camp fire other than at improved, designated and posted camp grounds on such areas.

"3. To have as a part of his or her equipment when using camp fires, except when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at improved, designated and posted camp grounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

"The proclamation shall be effective from and after the first day of July, 1934, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the thirtieth day of September, 1934."

These requirements are made just as lenient as compatible with the protection program before us. Camp fire permits may be obtained at the following places:

Glide Ranger Station, Glide, Oregon; Honey Creek fireman station, North Umpqua Road; Steamboat Bridge Guard Station, North Umpqua road; Wolf Creek Guard Station on the Little River Road; Tiller Ranger Station, Tiller, Oregon; Summit Guard Station near Tiller, Oregon; Devils Flat Guard Station, Cov Creek; Forest Boundary on the South Umpqua River; Big Camas Ranger Station; Kelsey Valley; Diamond Lake; Layng Creek Ranger Station; Musick Guard Station, and Forest Supervisor's office at Roseburg, Oregon.

to reddish purple, serve to accentuate the clumps of plants with larger and more vivid flowers. Mrs. Bayers uses many iris. Her varieties include Dutch, Spanish, English, Japan, dwarf and native types. Some lovely blue English iris is now in bloom as well as a large clump of purple Japanese iris. Other varieties are, of course, now out of season.

The pools contain white, pink and red water lilies, which are just beginning to bloom. This rock garden is excellently designed and constructed.

Rock Gardens and Pools

The rock garden at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Bayers on Spurgeon Hill occupies a steep incline near the street, and has a natural background of large trees and native shrubs which are not close enough to injure the pools by roots or too dense shade. The garden consists of a series of five pools of different shapes and sizes located on different levels and connected by rock work. The lower pools are supplied with water from the large upper pool by means of a waterfall. Two fountains are installed in the upper pool, one a large mass of oyster rock from the beach, the other a baby seal which washes its sleek shoulders with a slender stream of water. The pools are made easily accessible by stepping stones, laid down the steep slope.

All the work was done by Mr. and Mrs. Bayers. The time of development covers a period of about five years. Mr. Bayers did the excavating and the concrete work, while Mrs. Bayers did the loose work, which means the placing of the rocks and the planting.

With the exception of a few tall plants in the background which reseeded themselves from other parts of the yard, only true rock plants have been used. They have now attained their maximum growth and completely fill the interstices between the rocks.

The varieties are not numerous and the large, low masses of creeping thyme, varying in shades from white
