Increase in Postal Rates

A recent amendment to the Postal laws provides that, effective July 9, in addition to the charge of ten cents shall be made for the delivery of registered, insured or C. O. D. mail, the delivery of which has been restricted to the addressee, or his order. A further recent change in the Postal Laws provides, as compensation for the extra labor involved in paying a money order at an office other than on which the order is drawn, a fee equal to the original fee paid when the order was purchased is to be charged when the order is paid. As an example, a money order for \$50 is drawn on Myrtle Point, but paid by the post office in Coquille, a fee of 18 cents is charged by the Coquille post office for cashing the order.

Receives University Scholarship

Farm Loans Reach Large Sum

Farm land loans of the Federal Land bank of Spokane hit the \$8,258,100 mark for the month of June, bringing a new lease on life to 3211 farmers of the four Pacific northwest states.

The Land bank made 954 loans totaling \$3,427,500 for its own account in June and 2257 loans for an aggregate of \$4,830,000 from Land Bank Commissioner's funds.
