**Paul Bunyan Averts Strike**

Study of the unnatural history of southwestern Oregon has revealed that the fire-weed and lupine are not indigenous to the Oregon coast region but are of exotic origin. These two flowering plants, which grow in profusion at Smiling River farm, were introduced by Paul Bunyan at the request of Hot Biscuit Slim. This was coincident to the building of the whale corral at Coos Bay, history relates, when Paul's loggers were on the point of open rebellion because there was no honey for their hot biscuits. Paul was a man of action, and hastily going into conference with Johnny Inkslinger, conceived the idea of sending for the Smiling River bees, Bum and Bill, and planting their favorite flowers. The strike was happily averted, and on Sept. 6, 7 and 8 at the Armory in Marshfield this and other incidents in the life of the famous woodsman will be reviewed.

**Recording Wind Velocity**

The weather bureau says that records showing the highest velocity of winds that occur in severe storms are rarely recorded, since the instruments for recording wind volumes are usually not capable of withstanding the highest velocities that are sometimes known to exist. However, a dependable velocity of 138 miles per hour was recorded at Cape Lookout, N. C., in August, 1870.

**Use for Licorice**
