

Return From Assembly

Quake Lasts 41 Minutes

Some months ago the Sentinel had an item about Joseph Bognuda, of Ferndale, Calif., who was the first to discover that the waves pounding on the seashore affect seismographs. The following, clipped from the Ferndale Enterprise, tells of Mr. Bognuda's report on the earthquake which occurred two weeks ago this afternoon:

According to Joseph Bognuda, in charge of the Ferndale and Eureka earthquake recording instruments, the shock felt throughout Humboldt at 2:50 p. m. last Friday was the first quake of sufficient intensity to set off the accelerographs and displacement meter since their installation over a year ago. Although the earth movement was extremely great, the slowness of the motion eliminated any damage whatever to buildings.

The severe vibrations broke the pen of the University of California seismograph in Ferndale after 20 seconds of recording. The quake, slightly more severe in Ferndale than in Eureka, could be felt by a person for about five seconds but it continued to record on the machines for forty-one minutes.

After the damage to the local seismograph, the accelerograph at Ferndale and the one in Eureka and the displacement meter in Eureka started their recording, those in Eureka beginning about five seconds later than the Ferndale instrument. The photographs made by these instruments of all vibrations in every direction are the first to be obtained here and are among the very first in California. Bognuda will send the records to the University of California, where, in connection with the Coast Geodetic Survey, they are studied, the information gained being used in construction of earthquake-proof buildings.
