Bridge May Start Next Week

Temporary offices of the Northwest Roads Co., contractors who will build the concrete work for the Coos Bay bridge, have been opened in the bank building at North Bend, says the Harbor. Mr. E. C. Pantan, superintendent, and Mr. L. S. Hinton, office manager, are here and have been busy unpacking a half dozen large office desks, typewriters, supplies, etc. Mr. F. J. Clapham, engineer and draughtsman, will also have his office there.

Mr. Pantan stated today that he has been promised repeatedly that the contract with his company will be signed, but that his later information is that this will actually occur and work will then be started next week. However, he said he was uncertain about this but was exceptionally anxious to get the work under way during good weather.

His first work will be the building of a large office and warehouse near the right of way and driving piling for the temporary structure.

Conditions arising from the strike has held up the work, but when this is settled the company is ready to move forward quickly and in a large way.
