He was united to Sarah A. Swears in 1891, and after a year or two on a homestead in Washington they came to Coquille. For years he owned and operated what is now the Jos. Scolari ranch just north of Coquille but sold it about 13 years ago to Mr. Scolari. Since then he and Mrs. Watson have resided in the Watson House, just off the highway on Front street.

Beside his widow he is survived by three sons, Roy, of Marshfield; Irwin, who lives north of Coos Bay; and Fred, of Coquille.
