Open Season Dates

Following is a synopsis of the 1934 hunting regulations as promulgated by the Oregon State Game Commission for Coos county:

All opening and closing orders were determined on the basis of providing the county with the greatest variety of hunting consistent with conservation of game to the ultimate benefit of the state at large.

Bear: Open season entire year in Coos county.

Buck Deer with forked horns: Open season September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two Columbian blacktail deer or one mule deer, in eastern Oregon, with the requirement that both deer tags must be affixed to the mule deer.

Silver Gray Squirrels: Open season September 15 to October 20. Bag limit, five such squirrels in any seven consecutive days.

Chinese Pheasants: Open season October 15 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit: Unless otherwise specifically provided for, the bag limit on Chinese pheasants shall be four of such birds in any one day or eight in any seven consecutive days, provided, that it is unlawful to take more than one female Chinese pheasant in any seven consecutive days.

Quail: Open season (mountain or plumed and California or valley quail only) from October 15 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit: Ten such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Grouse and Native Pheasants: Open season (sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasants) October 15 to October 31, both dates inclusive. Bag limit: four such birds in any one day or eight in any seven consecutive days.

Two deaths occurred in the Rosenblad family within 24 hours this week, says the Bandon World. Miss Vera Rosenblad, daughter of Captain and Mrs. Karl Rosenblad, passed away at the family home in Bandon early Tuesday morning, as the result of a heart ailment that she had suffered since childhood. Mrs. Elise Erickson, mother of Mrs. Rosenblad, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. J. Hinderlie at North Bend, early Wednesday morning. She was there on a visit and several weeks ago suffered a stroke from which she failed to recover.

His daughter's death occurred just a few hours before Capt. Rosenblad arrived in port on the Alvarado.
