The men operating the ferry across Coos River near the forks of the river, reported that Sunday, August 5th, was their biggest day, when over 600 cars crossed. Traffic on the Ferry Oregon across Coos Bay during the past week has been unusually heavy, according to Captain Graham, averaging nearly 900 cars a day. From the first of August to the 7th inclusive the ferry has carried 6094 automobiles, 17,181 passengers, one double team and 66 head of stock.
