State Fair This Year to Be Best Yet Held

Writing to Oregon newspapers, Max Gehlhar, director of the Oregon State Fair, which opens its doors next Monday, mentions the following nine outstanding attractions at this year's fair which it well behooves every one to pay particular attention to. It is by no means the complete list of attractions but he mentions them as ones which should not be overlooked:

- 1. The animated fifty feet long "Know Your Oregon" exhibit. This carries out the confidence of a future "Oregon Electrified," contains a replica of the Bonneville Dam, its power pulsating Oregon's farms, homes, industries, Willamette flowing into the Columbia. Forty of the types of Oregon farms in miniature, flocks, herds, orchards, gardens, both in eastern and western Oregon, miniature trains hauling Oregon's crops to the markets of the world, construction cost of exhibit over \$4000.00. Oregonians will learn more in an hour's intensive study of this animated exhibit than in a two weeks' auto tour of the state.
- 2. Dairy exhibits in Agricultural Building. a. The least a dairyman can do to produce Grade A butter. b. The least a dairyman can do to produce Grade A milk. c. The finished product in the new refrigerator.
- 3. The cow and hen marathon. Thirty Smith Hughes high schools each entering a cow in a seven-day contest to determine which breed or cross breed produces a pound of butter for the least money. Oregon's farm prosperity hinges on a better understanding of this. Thirty Smith Hughes high schools each enter twelve laying hens in a similar contest in the same building. The whole exhibit is also an entertaining show.
- 4. Summer pasture for western Oregon dairy farms. An irrigation project actually at work. Ladino clover "under the ditch" on one of Oregon's poorest pieces of land—right on the Midway and worthy of its place.
- 5. The Silver Palace Poultry Pavilion—said to be the Nation's most beautiful. One acre of ground. One mile of silvered coops. Four thousand entries. Three times last year's space, but sorry, way too small.
- 6. Flowers—thousand and thousands. "The Fair Beautiful." Oregon just has the climate to do it. Just a showing of what can be done in one year on poor soil.
- 7. Finest racing plant in West, except one in Mexico.
- 8. Livestock judging Monday and Tuesday in the New Multiple Outdoor Judging Arena that will make your heart glad. You never knew that livestock could be so thrilling. To understand Oregon and its farm people the minimum time here alone should be two hours. You will be most agreeably surprised.
- 9. Then, of course,—what you expect to see at a fair. All over the ground exhibitors enthusiastic with the new set up. In nearly all lines finer exhibits and more of them in Livestock, Agriculture, Industry.
