Mr. and Mrs. Beyers told of their trip to Astoria and Seaside and of visiting the floral establishment where ex-Mayor George Baker is now specializing in tuberous-rooted begonias.

The contest for the cup was between Mrs. Beyers and Mrs. Schroeder; Mrs. Beyers was the winner. Mrs. Beyers' bouquet was of zinnias and michaelmas daisies and Mrs. Schroeder's of zinnias and Guinea Gold marigolds. Mrs. Beyers made a motion that Mrs. Schroeder be given credit for the times when she had brought bouquets when there were no other contestants and it carried, thus giving Mrs. Schroeder three more votes in the contest for the cup.

A short discussion on an insect that caused zinnias to die followed. No real remedy is known except to plant in new ground.

Mrs. Schroeder thought it would be a good plan while the club has sufficient funds to invest in a basket be used for exhibition purposes. Mrs. Dutton offered to make the basket if

the club would buy the material. Mr. Taylor appointed a committee of three on ways and means to report at the next meeting; Mrs. Beyers, chairman, Mrs. Schroeder and Mrs. Pettengill were the other two members.

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### Three Ports Out of Debt

The port of Coquille river is one of three Oregon port districts which has no outstanding bonded debt, according to reports submitted to State Treasurer Holman. The other two are the Port of Alsea and the Port of Siuslaw, the latter having paid off a debt of \$29,000 in the past two years.

The net debt of the 13 port districts of the state, Holman's report shows, has been reduced \$789,577.86 in the past two years. Only two port districts have increased their debt load in that period. They are the port of Astoria and the port of Port Orford. The debt burden of the Port of Bay City remains as it was two years ago at \$397,000.
