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DEMOCRACY IS AT STAKE

Union Labor's use of violence must be curbed by Democracy if Democracy is to survive. If Union Labor is able to humble Democracy, our enfeebled government will be unable to resist seizure by whatever group or faction has the will and power. That faction may not be Labor. Judging from history, it is more likely to be Fascist. Under Fascist domination, Labor is crushed, along with Freedom. Against faction of any kind—Labor, Employer, Fascist—Democracy must be able to retain its authority, or it will go down. It is primary that Government, regardless of its form, must be able to maintain itself against Faction, or its form will be changed. What is true of all forms of government is true of Democracy as one form of government; it must maintain its own authority or it will be overwhelmed and go out of existence.

Is Democracy worth saving? Many today say it is a failure; if they are in the saddle, they want to substitute some effective form of Fascism; if they are under the hoofs, they want a dictatorship by the proletariat.

That Democracy is worth saving is the conviction of patriotic citizens who feel solemn pride in citizenship in a government "of the people, by the people and for the people" and who are willing to sacrifice their lives and fortunes to save this precious form of government as a blessing to the future.

If Democracy is to be saved, it will be by the active loyalty of patriotic citizens in upholding the authority of our government in dealing with lawlessness by factions as well as lawlessness by individuals. The lawlessness of Union Labor is at present the chief threat. Unless Government can rise to its responsibility, by exerting its authority decisively, firmly and effectively, to repress this violence and maintain law and order, Government will be unable to save itself.—Oregon Voter.

Corn-Hog Control Meeting

Members of community committees of the Coos and Curry County Corn-Hog Control association met in the county agent's office Monday at the call of W. E. Cross, president of the organization, and listened to an explanation of the present status of the corn-hog reduction program.

Contracts of local producers with supporting evidence were sent to the State Board of Review for consideration some time ago by the local committee. The contracts were just returned with the county quota given and it was for the purpose of explaining developments up to this time in the program that the meeting of committeemen was called.

Because of the refusal of the Oregon officials to accept the allotment offered by the corn-hog section because it was felt to be unjust to producers, all contracts with their supporting evidence have been considered by the state committee. The corn-hog allotment committee for Coos and Curry counties, consisting of W. E. Cross of Coquille, Ben Monson of Lakeside, and Ed Lawrence of Pistol River, will be in session immediately following this meeting and will complete the allotment for each of the producers' contracts. These contracts will then be presented to each participant for his final signature at meetings to be held during the latter part of the week. Each producer will receive a circular mentioning the time and place of the meeting, also listing his hog quota, the number of hogs he can produce during 1934 under the contract, and the total of his benefit payments if the contract is signed.
