Will Rogers in "Handy Andy" at the Liberty Sunday

"From the halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli" . . . the first to start fighting—and the last to stop romancing.

That, in brief, is a word picture of the hard-hitting, heavy-loving crew of Leathernecks watched over by Richard Arlen and his laugh-pal, Roscoe Karns, in the speedy romance, "Come On Marines!" coming tonight to the Liberty Theatre.

The story opens up with Arlen trying his hardest to keep from getting into another jam, after his examination for Officer's Training School appointment has been approved. But the gals win out; he gets in bad with the General again, and is sent to the tropics to once more work his way up from the rank of Sergeant. News of an insurgent uprising brings quick action, especially when word comes of a wrecked party from an exclusive children's school. Racing to the jungle coast, they find the "children" are grown-up blondes.

Problems of young love are treated in a unique and sympathetic manner in "Chance at Heaven," coming as the preview on Friday and Saturday nights. The central situation of "Chance at Heaven" finds the romance of a small town boy and girl threatened when a beautiful and wealthy girl from New York comes to the village to spend a summer vacation. To him she is an enchantress from another world; to her he is a refreshing novelty from the types she has always known. As their mutual attraction grows, the boy's home town sweetheart finds herself slipping—until a tense climax provides a happy conclusion.

His wife wanted him to retire and play a little . . . but all play and no work makes Will a wild boy. That, in brief, is the story of Will Rogers' latest picture, "Handy Andy," coming to the Liberty Theatre on Sunday. Advance reports from the previews say this is the funniest comedy of his career.

Will is getting along comfortably in his drug store, when his wife, Peggy Wood, persuades him to sell out. First he takes up pigeon raising, but he has to stop that when his pets fly all over the house. Next he takes up golf, with uproarious results. Then his wife and daughter, Mary Carlisle, persuade him to attend the Mardi Gras in New Orleans. That's when things really begin to

happen. Will begs off from attending the Comus costume ball. Wandering around alone, he gets acquainted with a fellow druggist and his dashing girl friends, Conchita Montenegro. A few cocktails make him change his mind about the ball, and he attends with Conchita, choosing a Tarzan leopard-skin costume. A few more cocktails help persuade him to do an hilarious adagio dance with Conchita—and the ball breaks up in a riot.

Of course there's more to the story than that. Much more. Among other things Will serves as cupid in his daughter's romance with a young man his wife doesn't approve of. And there's a surprise ending that can't be tipped off in advance.

Only Hens That Do Not Go Broody, for Breeders

In flocks of farm poultry of breeds such as Rhode Island Reds, Plymouth Rocks, and Wyandottes, in which some hens go broody and others do not, it pays to cull the broody hens and to use in the breeding flock only the hens that do not go broody.

In studies of poultry breeding at the United States animal husbandry experiment farm, at Beltsville, Md., Department of Agriculture investigators found that in the flock of Rhode Island Reds the pullets that went broody laid on the average about 180 eggs in their first year, in comparison with an average of approximately 205 eggs by the pullets that did not go broody. The difference of two dozen eggs in a year would make a material difference in the profit from a hen. The tendency toward broodiness is, to a considerable degree, hereditary.

Broody hens are likely to have broody daughters. In a few years the culling of broody hens from the laying flock would materially reduce the broodiness of the flock.

Feed Grain for Hoppers

The generally accepted theory that hens must be made to scratch for their feed in order to keep in good physical condition has been pretty well refuted by results obtained from hens kept in laying batteries. In close confinement the hens have not had a chance for much exercise, yet they produce well. Recent tests at eastern experiment stations show that grains as well as mash can be fed in self-feeders with good results.

John Howard Paine's Tomb
John Howard Paine, author of "Home, Sweet Home" was first interred at Tunis, Africa, where he died. In 1883 his body was brought home and interred at a great public funeral in Oak Hill cemetery, Washington, D. C.

Race Horse's Temperament

The temperament of a race horse is as important as his speed. The exciting, prancing racer, with his sheeny coat glistening with perspiration, is not wanted by the veteran trainer. Give him the phlegmatic, go-as-you-please horse which takes every thing as it comes. If he has not such a horse he endeavors to make all conditions tend toward making such a one.

Countries on the Globe

The number of countries on the globe depends on whether self government is considered or whether one means political and geographic divisions. If the former, there are 77 countries which may be called nations, including small, independent countries like Monaco. If the latter, there are of course many more—approximately 710.

Boiling Red Water in Andes

Boiling red water has been found in a mysterious lake in a deep basin in the Andes in South America and animal and plant life cannot live near the basin, which is believed to be the crater of a semi-extinct volcano, the gases of which agitate the water.

Pillar of Solid Salt

A pillar of solid salt, which is pointed out as "Lot's Wife," stands on the slope of Jebel Usdum, near the shore of the Dead sea. Millions of tons of salt and other chemicals are taken from this body of water and shipped to all parts of the world.
