Coos Cattle Tested for

Bang's Disease Soon

Dairymen in Coos county will have an opportunity to have their cattle tested for Bang's disease under the government program starting in about three weeks, according to Dr. W. V. Glaisyer, who is now testing the cattle in Curry county, and whose services were obtained by the federal government to do this testing in both Coos and Curry counties.

Dairy herds south of Gold Beach in Curry county have been tested up to this time and in this section co-operation has been practically one hundred per cent. The testing should be completed in northern Curry county within the next three weeks, it was estimated.

According to the plan outlined by Dr. Sam B. Foster, federal veterinarian who is in charge of this work in Oregon, in conference with D. F. Thompson, county judge, Roger Morse, extension dairyman, Dr. W. V. Glaisyer and George Jenkins, county agent, the testing work in Coos county will be done by Dr. Glaisyer. Educational work, preliminary to the testing, will be conducted by County Agent Jenkins with the assistance of other extension workers.

Starting within the next few days and a short time before the testing will start in each community, dairymen's meetings will be held, at which time the program will be carefully explained and the agreement will be considered.

According to this agreement, which will be signed by the co-operating dairymen and by the Secretary of Agriculture, the dairyman agrees to market for slaughter under state or federal supervision, within a reasonable time, all heifers over six months of age, cows and bulls in his herd which are designated by agents of the Secretary as reacting to the agglutination test for Bang's disease. After the herd has been tested and reactors marketed for slaughter, the dairyman must continue blood testing the animals in his herd in accordance with the accredited Bang's disease herd plan in the state, continuing such testing until his herd is eligible for accreditation. Certain requirements regarding addition of animals to the herd and cleaning and disinfecting premises, are also made of the dairyman signing the agreement.

Under this plan the Secretary of Agriculture agrees that the owner's herd shall be tested for Bang's disease without expense to the owner. Also, it is agreed to pay the owner, upon proof of compliance with the terms of the agreement, an amount for each animal, except unregistered bull, marketed in accordance with this agreement, equal to the appraisal less the net proceeds of marketing the animal and less any other moneys received because of the elimination of the animal, but in no event to exceed \$20 for grade animals and \$50 for registered purebred animals.

It is understood that the chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry may, at his discretion, determine that a second test shall be made of the owner's herd and that in the event of such second test reactors shall be eliminated and payment made in the same manner as his reactors at the first test.

Judging from the number of requests made for information on this program, many Coos county dairymen plan to take advantage of the government's plan to get rid of reactors, and the agreement may be signed in advance of the meetings by calling at the county agent's office, Mr. Jenkins stated.

His deserted car was found on the street in Myrtle Creek, Douglas county, and taken in charge by the officers, after it had stood there all day Wednesday.

He left his travelling bag and brief case in his bedroom at the Myrtle Point hotel, and the bed showed he had slept in it, but no one saw him leave during the night or early morning.

Only his billfold and driver's license was found in the car at Myrtle Creek.

"Dames," Musical Extravaganza to Be Shown at Liberty Sunday
--Wild Horses on the Screen Tonight

Rex, acknowledged throughout the country as one of the greatest horses ever trained by man, makes his talking debut with two thousand other wild horses in "King of the Wild Horses," at the Liberty tonight.

"King of the Wild Horses" was filmed entirely on location on the government reservation of the Navajo and Hopi Indians in northern Arizona. Not one scene was shot inside a studio, and thousands of Indians as well as the herd of two thousand wild horses appear in the glamorous and stimulating scenes of this spectacular picture.

Only two of the many Indian roles are played by white people, and this was permitted only after three weeks had been spent at the Columbia Studios testing more than seventy-five actors and actresses for the juvenile leads.

Every effort was expended by the studio to reproduce more faithfully than ever before an exact picture of the colorful and curiously superstitious life that the Navajos lead. One indication of the length to which Columbia went, was the filming for the first time in the history of the screen, the Butterfly Dance of the Hopi tribe, one of the most sacred of their religious ceremonies. Only after long parley did the Indians give permission. This dance has never been photographed before, either by a motion picture or any other kind of camera.
