Public Lands Withdrawn

By executive order of November 28, 1934, all the vacant, unreserved and unappropriated public land in twelve states, including Oregon, were temporarily withdrawn from settlement, location, sale or entry, and reserved for classification and pending determination of the most useful purpose to which such land may be put in consideration of the provisions of the Taylor Grazing Act of June 28, 1934, and for the conservation and development of natural resources. The withdrawal is subject to existing valid rights. The vacant land will be subject to mineral location, except the powersite land. The withdrawal is subject to existing valid rights. This applies to Oregon & California Railroad Grant Lands, and Coos Bay Wagon Road Grant Lands.

This order will remain in full force and effect unless and until revoked by the President or by act of Congress.

Applications for land can no longer be received.
